Have you ever felt unwelcome somewhere? At a church? Our new series begins with You. You, no matter if you believe or not, no matter what you struggle with, no matter how you dress or speak, you are welcome here. Just as Christ welcomed the crowd, not asking any questions to determine worth, value, or genuine interest. So too we, as the Church, welcome everyone without question. You are welcome here.

Sept 24

If you love only those who love you, what reward is there for that? Even corrupt tax collectors do that much. If you are kind only to your friends, how are you different from anyone else? Even pagans do that.

Matthew 5:46-47

It's not natural for us, as people, to be welcoming of people who are different from us. But as Christ followers, we are expected to welcome everyone. Jesus slammed those who only welcome their

friends by comparing them to tax collectors, who were considered thieves at that time. Even thieves are willing to welcome friends. You are welcome here no matter who you are. So make sure that everyone else here feels just as welcomed.

Church is not a museum full of perfect people. Church is a hospital for the broken. God welcomes us even with all of our brokenness, and God is anxious to heal us. We are made more beautiful and stronger through our brokenness, by giving it to God. You are welcome here, broken as you are. You are not expected to be "okay" and you are not expected to put on the face of a perfect person.

This declaration by Jesus sheds light on Jesus' affirmation that Peter's insight into Jesus true identity was a divine revelation. Only persons whose eyes are open to truth can really recognize the truth. Otherwise, we stay stuck either in liminal space where we remain disoriented with a sense of unsettledness or we retreat back into the comfortable arms of this world where truth is relative and Jesus remains a historical figure rather than our God and Savior.

Too many of us who claim to be Christ followers confess with words alone while never quite leaving the comfort of that which we know. This retreat back into the comfortable allows us to deceive ourselves into thinking that we are good to go.

Nothing could be further from the truth and when we are confronted with the truth our defenses go into full alert.

We sense danger as the life that we currently live seems to be under attack. Some of us retreat. We run away. Some of us remain frozen, disoriented and unable to move forward or backward. Sadly, some of us attack as though our very survival depends upon how much damage we can inflict. We seem willing to sacrifice our self and any and all around us to remain in our comfortable denial that does not ask for sacrifice.

Sadly, we have seen all of this played out at Asbury just as we have seen this played "But who do you say I am?" Matthew 16:15

out throughout the history of the church and in the public forum. Jesus says that "I am the way, the truth, and the life" (John 14:6), But Jesus also said that if we want to have eternal life we must be willing to die to life in this world.

Eternal life begins with a confession that Jesus is the Messiah. But we must move forward out of liminal space, out of our disorientation and denial, and into the light of Jesus Christ. This is a light which does not attack, does not insist that we live in the past, and it is a light towards a future kingdom that looks nothing like our current existence.

Scripture, the voice of truth, tells us that in Christ we are made into a new creation. We are not the outdated furniture in what was formerly called the parlor. We are not the sign that still hangs above the door as we come into our worship center that reads "nave." We are not the fixtures and furniture that has served us and earlier generations well but is no longer serving the church of today. We are not the building, the furniture, the fixtures nor even our own ideals about what things should look like and be. We are disciples of Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, Messiah, Emmanuel.

Last Sunday we talked about how the Holy Spirit is given to us as a gift. In our prayers we prayed that the Holy Spirit would open our eyes to the truth. This Sunday our prayer bead is not a bead at all, but a cross. We began our series on prayer with recognizing God (the larger, gold bead) and we end our series with the cross.

God lived incarnate in the world that we inhabit. A world of violence. And God illustrated God's nature in the nature of Jesus the Christ. But the world did not recognize the nature of divine truth which seemed to contradict that which they knew. It seemed even harder for those who grew up in the church to recognize truth. Those who

claimed to be righteous because they worshiped at the temple which reflected the order that they had arranged were blind to their own sin. Jesus confronted their deeply held beliefs about themselves and the world and they seemed blinded by the truth.

Jesus knew that the Temple would soon be destroyed and He warned His disciples not to become enamored with buildings. As they left the Temple the disciples were mesmerized by the fixtures and artwork when Jesus told them what was to come. Later His detractors would use His words against Him in their charge that Jesus was guilty of sinning against God. These keepers of the temple fixtures were blind to the truth even as the truth was right in front of their faces. God had chosen not to reveal divine truth to them. Perhaps God gave them a choice to make and in their disorientation they simply could not move forward into a future that was unfamiliar. Can you empathize with their stubbornness? Have you ever felt so certain of something only to discover that you were on the wrong side of the facts?

Perhaps you are there now or at least you are wondering if you could be wrong

about Jesus Christ. Perhaps you realize that even though you have been baptized, even though you have spent years in church, or reading your Bible, or believing that your confession that Jesus Christ is Lord was sufficient. Perhaps you have been wondering for some time now "Is this all there is to following Jesus?"

Don't let your baptismal water remain stagnate. Stop accepting the lie that following Jesus Christ is all about proper form or ancient traditions or pieces of furniture, artwork, memorials, pictures or even stained glass. If you are feeling unsure about your relationship with Jesus Christ pray that He will reveal Himself in some powerful and undeniable way. Tell Him that you are ready to follow Him but aren't sure just what this means. If you are feeling comfortable with your relationship with Jesus Christ pray that He challenge you to go to the next step in your discipleship. Jesus is the way and the truth. Amen.
