The Road to Hope

Paul states the obvious in his letter to the church in Rome. Who hopes for what they already have? The answer is no one. There's no need. We might hope for it to last, for the next version and so forth, but when we already have something hope is not a part of our thinking.

So there's a knock at the door and when you answer the person standing on your porch says to you "Do you have a plan for your afterlife?" "What ... When?" you reply back wondering if this person is about to waste your time pitching a life insurance policy. The person clarifies. "Have you been saved? Is your salvation assured? Do you know that you are going to heaven?"

Regretting answering the door you choose to be polite but look for a way to end the conversation. On the other hand, it is a great question. Just not a ques-

tion you really want to answer. And there are so many assumptions in his question. Is salvation like a treatment plan? The goal is for me to be saved so I need to get agreement on a plan that leads to the desired outcome?

You know the "sinner's prayer" and have even whispered it out loud at a revival but that was years ago. Wasn't that all I had to do? "Yes" you blurt out. "Yes I have been saved" bringing the conversation to an end. Or so you hope.

Paul also writes in this same chapter of Romans that:

For we know that all creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth right up to the present time. And we believers also groan, even though we have the Holy Spirit within us as a foretaste of future glory, for we long for our bodies to be released from sin and suffering. We, too, wait with eager hope for the day when God will give us our full rights as his adopted children, including the new bodies he has promised us. Romans 8:22-23

Paul acknowledges that we are a work in progress. Saved but not yet perfected. Not only are our bodies decaying but we are plagued with a "sinful nature" that causes us to stray away from the will of God despite our best efforts. Only the Holy Spirit can keep us from sinning but we have a role to play.

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We were given this hope when we were saved. (If we already have something, we don't need to hope for it. But if we look forward to something we don't yet have, we must wait patiently and confidently).

Therefore, I am called to speak and do acts of hope. The Spirit helps me through the fruit that can only come from the Spirit. These fruits are listed in Galatians 5:22-23 as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self -control. I cannot produce these fruits on my own power and when others testify against me they are really testifying against the Holy Spirit. When others claim that I fall short of their expectations they are expecting fruit from me that the Spirit has chosen not to offer me. When others claim that I am not doing what they expect me to do they are expecting someone who is not a missionary.

I am a missionary. And as a missionary I am called to bring the good news of salvation to a people who want desperately to be saved. I am not, therefore, called to minister to the already saved. Missionaries carry out the work of mission and the mission to which I am called is to be an agent of transformation that is only possible

through faith in Jesus Christ. A faith which requires obedience. A faith which requires surrender. A faith in which there is no room for our control of others. A faith that relies on the only force who can save us. The Holy Spirit of God. A faith that understands that hope is a verb and that salvation is both now and later.

Jesus stated the mission for those of us called to be missionaries in Luke 4:18-19. It was a restatement of the same mission that God spoke to missionaries through the Prophet Elijah. The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, for he has anointed me to bring Good News to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim that captives will be released, that the blind will see, that the oppressed will be set free, and that the time of the Lord's favor has come. This is the mission of the missionary. This is the mission of a hope that saves.

Will you join me in this mission? Will you follow the One that I follow? Not led by me but walking with me? Will you follow in the

footsteps of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ who was, who is and who forever will be the source of life and salvation. Will you follow Him with me and bring the good news of salvation to a world desperate for hope?

We are not enslaved by the Spirit as unwilling captives. Jesus demonstrated how to stay in tune with the Holy Spirit and we are called to emulate His practices. Prayer, studying scripture with others, worship and so on. These are the disciplines of a life in Christ that keep us in harmony with the Spirit.

So we hope, Paul explains, because we do not yet have that which we hope for. The porch is empty and you are free to return to whatever was occupying your time before the knock at the door. Instead you pick up a Bible allowing it to open to whatever page is visible. You begin in the middle of the page:

But I will keep on hoping for your help; I will promise you more and more.

Psalm 71:14 NLT

What help am I hoping for? Your eyes move up to the beginning of the Psalm:

O Lord, I have come to you for protection; don't let me be disgraced. Save me and rescue me, for you do what is right. Turn your ear to listen to me, and set me free. Be my rock of safety where I can always hide. Give the order to save me, for you are my rock and my fortress.

Psalm 71:1-3 NLT

The writer of this Psalm does not seem to be talking about a plan to get to heaven. The writer is looking for hope right now. Protection and rescue. "Save me now" the writer pleads.

Your mind turns to the news that you heard the night before. Hurricanes, fires, earthquakes, mass shootings and more. You grab an envelope off the table that

But I will keep on hoping for your help; I will promise you more and more.

Psalm 71:14

contains the latest shut-off notice from Consumers to use as a bookmark in case you want to return to this Psalm later.

What do I hope for? While I have hope in eternal life and I have faith that I can depend on God to be God I do not have a treatment plan to get to heaven that has specific outcomes that I can use to make mid-course adjustments. I am entirely at God's mercy.

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But like the rest of creation I groan that I am still awaiting that day when I am one with the Holy Spirit, a time when I can see clearly. I am waiting for a time when I see the world the way God sees the world and I can love others the way that God loves us.

Hope in this case is a verb. Hope implies action out of a sense of urgency that what the Holy Spirit is leading me to do cannot wait until tomorrow. Patience is itself not passive. Like active listening to seek understanding in a conversation with some-

one, active patience requires that we are intentional about each day.

Are you waiting on a miracle? Hope is available, but it takes action. Are you asking God for what you need? Are you being obedient to God's Word, loving others and sharing your faith. Is there an area in your life where you are waiting on a miracle, but you are not doing your part?

Can anything ever separate us from Christ's love? No power in the sky above or in the earth below—indeed, nothing in all creation will ever be able to separate us from the love of God that is revealed in Christ Jesus our Lord.
