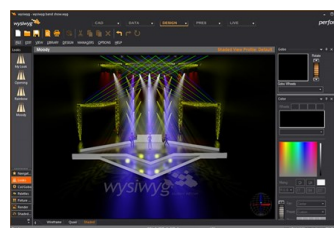

What if God isn't really looking for religion from us? What if God is really looking for relationship. Take Abraham. God began a relationship with Abraham when God told him to leave behind all that Abraham knew about the world and to go to a place to be named later. Abraham's relationship with God began with trust. Abraham had to trust that the God who called him would come through.

God didn't promise Abraham a thing. This would come later after Abraham proved himself to be trustworthy. A friendship built on trust be-

and angry. You have been betrayed. WYSIWYG is what you counted on but not what you got.

Trust takes time to develop. Trust comes out of predictability. We trust a friend not to tell a secret — they don't so we trust them with more secrets. A stranger says that they will do something for us and they do it. The next time they tell us something we are more likely to believe them. This pattern keeps up and they become another friend. We can count on them.

Trust develops in some cases but this isn't always our experience. Sooner or later we are let down. We are betrayed. This makes it harder to develop trust the next time. Some of us find it difficult to trust anyone. Some of us project our lack of trust in other people onto God.

Consider your relationship with God. Is your relationship WYSIWYG or

gan to take shape. Abraham, through his actions, showed that he could be trusted. Likewise, God showed Abraham that God could be trusted.

do you try to pretend that what you offer God is authentic rather than a stand-in for who you really are?

**Just say a simple “yes, I will or, no I won't”. Anything beyond this is from the evil one.**

Jesus covered a lot of territory in His Sermon on the Mount. One subject that is subtle but powerful is the idea of swearing an oath. The bottom-line, just do what you say your going to do rather than just when you swear on the Bible, or whatever your choice of binding symbol might be. There are too many situations where lying is expected. Lawyers, advertisers, friends, family and selling an old clunker. We expect untruth and we get it. But Jesus was clear. Tell the truth. Do what you say your going to do — always. Hold yourself accountability to your word.

But before you go to work on your friends who seem to say one thing and do another, work on yourself first. Don't just plan to do what you say only if all things fall into place — do it. If something out of your control does come up — own up to it and do better next time. Try a week where your “yes” is really yes and your “no” is really no.

An increasing number of persons, particularly young adults, claim that they are "spiritual" but not religious. Let's be honest, religions have earned a not so helpful reputation. Religious groups that vocalize extreme claims which infringe on human rights are understandably dismissed as spreading untruths about what God expects or wants. Less radical religious groups that use violent tactics to get attention to their claims add to this reputation and add fuel to the argument that keeps many people

away from churches and other communities of faith. But what if church isn't about religion? Jesus seemed to have His issues with religion as well. What can we learn from Him regarding this topic?

Jesus debated with the religious leaders who used law to circumvent love. Well intended or not, Jesus took issue with the consequences of their insistence on following rituals, even those based soundly on Biblical interpretation, when the result was alienation, op-

pression, discrimination or any other consequence that resulted in or prolonged suffering. Whether healing on the Sabbath or crossing social boundaries Jesus put relationship over religion. Most important, Jesus tells us, is our relationship with God. But our relationships with each are also critical. We cannot claim we love God if we do not love one another.

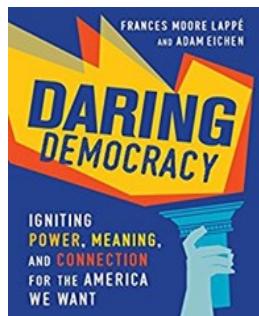

If there is a catch it is this message it is “We are invited but God is not insisting.” That is, each of us are invited to participate in God’s plan but God’s love is so strong and so certain that each of us are given choice to decide if we will participate or go our own way. Nevertheless, God’s plan is the only plan that will prevail.

God’s plan is comprehensive. God’s plan includes more than you and I, more than our neighborhood. It goes beyond Flint’s master plan and includes other towns and other cities. God’s plan includes our nation and other nations. It includes our planet and other planets. Our solar system and the rest of the universe. God is the God of all creation. All that there is or ever was. Now where do you fit?

When lead was discovered in the water that comes out of the faucets in our homes we realized

that we were “affected” by what was in our water that wasn’t there before. The higher concentrations of lead and other impurities have been found to result in certain consequences. We did not participate in the decision to change our water source. We are not the chemists who decided how to treat the water. We are not the testers who watch out for the public good. Yet we are affected. Even if we never drank the water. Even if we don’t live in Flint. We are affected because we are connected.

Let’s presume that you didn’t vote for our current governor who appointed the emergency manager who decided to switch our water supply to save money. Does this make you innocent? So in your world the innocent are punished? The innocent are simply affected while the guilty are the actors in the play that captures your life? This is over simplified. But unless you are you are totally dependent on others, without

influence on their choices, you make decisions about whether you install a faucet filter. You decide whether you will drink filtered water. You decide whether you only drink bottled water. You decide how long it will be before you trust our water source and those who have a part in its quality.

We all have a part in God’s plan and our part begins with acceptance. First, we accept that God has a plan, even if our acceptance is mostly based on hope. Next, we decide that we want to be an active player in God’s plan. We want to be one of the players whose actions result in positive change in the world around us. We want the “good” that God promised through the prophet Jeremiah.

Which means we will do that which God’s plan calls for us to do. But you likely realize that you can’t do this on your own. Even knowing what your role is proves to be beyond your ability. Yes you are human — one of God’s creatures. And you now realize that you are not God. But you also realize that you want to know God better than you do now.

For all the apparent rigidity in the laws that we read about in the first five books of the Bible when we read all the way through we gather a more open-minded God. Don’t let first impressions be your last Bible lesson. For example, by studying the prophets whom God uses to speak to the people you should notice that the words we read that God spoke through them are not hard and fast details of a plan. They are words like good, hope, love and joy, when we follow God’s plan, and words like darkness, anger, violence, sickness, blindness, oppression and death, when we go our own way. The details are left to unfold day to day as we choose to stay connected to God’s plan or not. The Bible is the only manuscript we are given. All of the commentary available are our various attempts at interpreting this manuscript.

When asked about the most important of the laws, Jesus lifted two which He offered as the key to all the rest. Love God and love each other. So simple. So complete. So hard to do it seems. Impossible, when we try and do it on our own.

## Loosely Connected

As a pastor I am painfully aware that the people I serve have lives outside of the church. So do I — sort of. I try not to bring “church” home with me to dinner or to family time or to bed. But honestly this is harder than you might think. Church consumes all of me in one way or another. I am not tangentially connected. The church is my lifeblood it seems.

This connection I’m describing is different than the topic of Sabbath. When I experience Sabbath I am still connected to Asbury — my connection doesn’t unplug so that I can rest alone in my Sabbath experience. I’m still plugged in. I’m still connected and energy flows back and forth even as I shift my focus to God, my family and my self-care. And the energy is oftentimes one-sided, draining me of vital energy that I would rather use in other ways.

So why did I choose the expression “painfully aware” when I started this reflection? First, I am aware. I get it. The rest of you have jobs, families, hobbies and things to do that do not involve the church. It is the ebb and flow of life. This is the way it is. But is this the way God intended it to be?

Most of you at some point have read about the first church in the Book of Acts. The description we read does not offer us a glimpse of life outside of the church for those first followers of Christ. Much like the core group that followed Jesus during His public ministry, eating together, praying together, traveling together—you get the point. Those first evangelist—those who were first called to share the good news were on a combination of boot camp, retreat, intensive study, you name it, that lasted two to three years.

This group was not tangentially connected. They were joined spiritually and otherwise. Jesus turned left and they followed. Jesus climbed in a boat and they followed. Jesus walked to His execution and they watched from behind the bushes.

Jesus also talked about His connection with God saying that God and He were One. The post-resurrection Christians have taken this to mean things like “of the same substance” but not the same “person.” Jesus is distinct from God but of the same substance as God and the same goes for the Holy Spirit and God. Confusing? Very much so. But critical to our understanding of what it means to be connected to Christ and to His church.

I read a reflection this morning written by Bradford Botsworth, a churchgoer living in Smyrna, Georgia. The scripture that he reflected on was from Mark when Jesus calms a storm after the disciples woke Him up in a panic. He writes: “we come to understand that right in the middle of our successes and failures, we find our faith, ourselves, and our peace—when we turn to him and allow him to calm the storms.”<sup>1</sup>

Perhaps this is one way for us to better understand what it may mean for us to be connected to Jesus and to each other. Are we in the boat together? Are we experiencing life’s storms together? Or do we take our personal lives elsewhere, in some other boat that is out of sight of our church?

Our Leadership Team adopted a strategic plan for Asbury. The same plan was adopted by both the church, by vote of our members, and by the Board of Directors of Asbury CDC. It is our course—the direction and destination for the boat that we have chosen to be in together. This means that every single person who wants to be a part of Asbury has a role in keeping our boat on track and in good working order.

We are in the same boat, so my metaphor says, and Jesus Christ is with us. Our voyage will face many successes and failures, both personal and as a church. We will face days of fair winds and blue skies and other days of blowing wind and stormy seas. And with each experience Christ will be with us for it is in His boat that we are traveling.

So whenever we are tangentially connected—when we choose to separate the rest of our life from our church family, while we may find Christ in whatever boat we have chosen, it will not be the same voyage, the same course or the same shipmates.

Perhaps this is why church comes home with me in more than just my emails and by computer. It is because I dare not get out of the boat for as long as Jesus is with me until which time He calls me elsewhere. Perhaps our boat, metaphorically speaking, is large enough to accommodate our independent travels, as long as we are connected spiritually and following the same course in harmony.

These two, most important expectations that God has for all creation depend upon each other. To love God is to love each other is to love God. Our series trilogy which naturally suggests the divine trilogy of God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit, will take us on a journey of discovery. Together we will discover new pieces of God's plan for each of us and collectively. The more of "us" who participate the more we can discern within our community of participators.

Who will you invite to go on this journey with us? Don't just consider friends and family. You already know a lot about them. But since we know that they too are a part of God's plan they can help us discover parts of God's plan that we otherwise may miss.
