Talking Donkeys

I promised last week that we would talk about the talking donkey this Sunday. So let's go back to the a chapter in the Book of Numbers where we learn about the prophet Balaam, whose story in scripture sounds like the answer to a trivia question. Yes it is true. God used a talking donkey to help a prophet gain clarity about what God had in mind.

Balaam was promised a big payoff by the King of Moab if he would put a curse on the encroaching Israelite people who had moved into his neighborhood. It was too late for the King to build a wall and he hadn't considered asking the Israelites pay for it.

The prophet is headed towards a gig that was sure to pay well if things worked out,

but it was not what God had in mind. Perhaps God decided to have some fun with him — well at least God found a way to get Balaam's attention. His donkey spoke to him. Really? Yes, a talking donkey.



At first, the donkey's actions were subtle, leaving the road and heading off into a field. Scripture tells us that the donkey saw an angel of God standing in the road

ahead and knew not to try and pass. So Balaam does the sort of thing a person does when they are determined to defy God. He beats the donkey until the animal submitted to heading down the same road.

Next the donkey, still subtle, rubs up against a rock wall smashing Balaam's foot against the stones, leading to another beating. This is great material for comic relief during an intense scene. But the angel was blocking the road again, seen clearly by the donkey but apparently not visible to Balaam who was determined to cash in on the King's increased offer for his services.

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Night Vision

This week we conclude our current series, *Do you hear what I hear?* and thus end the "lecture" portion of our teachings on discernment. Our next series, *Train wreck*, will take us into the laboratory for hands on learning. We will look at a few illustrations where others, including the prophet Balaam, have sometimes learned the hard way about divine discernment.

Some avoided train wrecks and others had to recover from train wrecks, having missed the divine road signs that were flashing danger ahead but were ignored.

Our last message in this series, *Night vision*, is about our want of clarity. We prefer more than a next step. How about a detailed "trip ticket" like the ones that AAA offered their members for road trips or an itinerary that spells out all of

the side trips, sights and scenes for our journey? But life is more about exploring unknown territory that no one has ever seen before than it is about predictable outcomes.

Several years ago I wrote a poem about my struggle for divine clarity titled *God lights my path*:

*I stood there staring down the Road
My eyes strained against my doubt*

I used the metaphor of shadows for the lack of clarity that God had given me regarding where He was leading me. I believed the promises of Psalm 23 of green pastures and still waters. But, at the same time, God had put a passion inside of me for working side by side with the marginalized and oppressed. How is this an image of a green pastor and still waters? In the same way, God had put a

sour taste in my mouth for privilege. But the greatest gift of all, in my opinion, was grace.



God gave me grace and made it clear that this grace was not mine to keep. Rather, I had to give it away. And God would give me more grace which I continued to need. And I had to give it away. This became a cycle that helped me to gain clarity. God was lighting the shadows even as I walked forward towards what would be considered an uncertain future by the world. Yet it was a certain path for me based on God's promises.

Darkness is a metaphor for all that is not divine and yet we all spend time in darkness which can hide both danger and opportunity. We are tempted to make images out of shadows — certainty out of uncertainty — and confuse need with want.

Yet if we will “only believe” in the promise of the Gospel, letting God be God, rather than trying to manipulate God into our own image, our own preferences, God will light our path. Balaam was a prophet back in the time before the Israelites became a settled people. God chose Balaam to reveal to those still living in darkness that God was in the process of a worldwide revival that would begin with the people of the Exodus who had left Egypt as a freed people.

Balaam did not receive the clarity that he would need all at once. He first had to do it his way. Next week we will get into the story of talking donkeys when we go into the laboratory. But this week we focus on being real about our desire for clarity and God's desire for faithful obedience.

Are you waiting for God to light the shadows that you see in front of you? Those obstacles and opportunities that are sufficiently blurry that its not clear which way to go? Are you able to believe that God has a plan for good that includes you?

Let's travel together knowing that like the Israelites, blessed by God and revealed through the prophet Balaam and others, is also blessing us. Do you hear what I hear? I hear the sound of blessings being unwrapped and waiting for us to take our next step.

key asks Balaam. “Well yes — of course you are. But what does that have to do with now?” Balaam responded (this response isn't actually in the scripture). “Have I ever acted like this before?” the donkey asks his now calmer friend. “Well no” the prophet replies.

The angel appears again in front of the donkey, this time in a narrow section of road, and not seeing any other option, the donkey lays down in the road. Balaam again starts beating the donkey when the animal speaks “What have I done to you to deserve you beating me three times?”

You got to hand it to the prophet. Instead of responding in disbelief, Balaam, still furious with the delays and now limping on a sore foot, talks back to the donkey rather than question whether he had lost his mind. “I beat you because you are making a fool out of me. If I had a sword I would kill you right where your laying” he shouts back in a rage.

Then the Lord gave the donkey the power of speech, and it said to Balaam, “What have I done to you? Why have you beaten me these three times?”

Numbers 22:28 GNT

The donkey not only talks but he defuses the situation with logic. If God is going to give a donkey the power of speech why not give him the ability to calmly argue with logic. This is good news for the rest of us when we are being a donkey. There is hope.

“Aren't I the same donkey that you have relied on all of your life?” the don-

God then opens Balaam’s eyes and now he can see the angel himself. The same angel that had caused the donkey to stop. Well Balaam regretted what he had done and laid face down in a demonstration of regret. The angel asked Balaam the same question the donkey had asked him. “Why did you beat your donkey three times?”

The angel goes on to explain that the donkey was being the smarter of the two and its a good thing because had the donkey allowed Balaam to keep going the angel would have killed Balaam and let the donkey live!

God, however, decides to use Balaam’s disobedience and salvage his wasted energy by allowing Balaam to continue his journey and take the job offer. But now Balaam is back in tune with what needs to happen next. By the way, Balaam never collects on the job since God had him bless rather than curse the Israelites.

So Balaam returned back home, a little poorer, but also a little wiser, than when he left, and the Israelites, not King Balak of Moab, lived happily together in the promised land.

I might as well confess that Balaam’s story resonated with me. I also can have tunnel vision and when I fail to pay attention to or worse, don’t take the time to listen and observe the signs around me. I become the classical idea of and name that we give a donkey. Balaam likely continued to limp for a

while — perhaps a reminder to pay a little more attention to the donkeys in his life.

How about you? Have you ever been so focused on the possibility of a big payoff for yourself that you failed to realize that God was trying to keep you from a train wreck? Note that Balaam was already in touch with God and yet he still gave into the temptation to focus on his own fame and fortune rather than obedience to God. All of us are susceptible to feeding our own ego and ignoring God’s plan. But hearing from God begins with listening for God and its never to late to start.

Our first message in our new series, *Train wreck*, is a story of avoidance. Balaam realized that God was trying to help him stay obedient just in time to avoid disaster. Come and travel with us over the next few weeks as we learn from scripture how to avoid disasters and to recover from those that we don’t avoid.

avoidance. And yet another subtitle: *Overcoming temptation through obedience.*

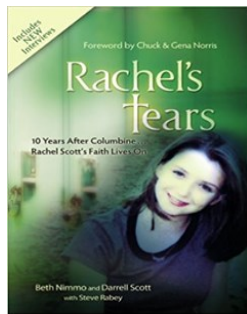
Most of us have felt like we were in a train wreck at some point or another. How do we recover from such a catastrophe? Even better, how can we avoid another train wreck? This series brings our journey into the heart of God's plan for us: Obedience.

Book Club News

Has any one ever invited you to watch a movie or read a book with the qualifier "Are you ready for a good cry?" For some of us, this "sweetens" the invitation and the answer is nearly always YES. For some, this qualifier is a disqualifier. Why set myself up to cry on purpose? Then there is the middle ground — the majority. We may dip our toes in emotionally but hold out as long as possible. "There's no crying in baseball!" is a line that comes to mind for me. That's a lie. I've coached hundreds of children in baseball and tears are a part of the game. And a part of life.

As we put our last book selection behind us we turn from analysis to real life. While our last book was non-fiction and full of reporting on life it was mostly at a societal level as we analyzed the



state of our democracy, or lack thereof, from a safe distance. Our next book invites us into the story — into the lives of a family devastated by our inability as a people to provide safety for our children. Not because we aren't trying hard. But perhaps our lack of democracy plays a bigger role than we may care to recognize.

In our study just finished, authors Frances Moore Lappe and Adam Eichen argue that "Democracy is not a choice. Creating democracies truly accountable to their citizens is essential to our very survival—to the flourishing of societies supporting human life, and now, because of climate change, to the survival of the Earth..." The burning question is "What is the world that we want to create together?"

Certainly, our children are at the center of our hopes. As school shootings continue at an increasing rate while politicians huddle in back rooms to find new ways to protect the interest of gun manufacturers and political contributions our youth are rising up and calling them to come out and look into the faces of children who are both afraid and tired of adults unwilling to take action. Our children are using their voices and their votes for change, even as some states try to create new obstacles that discourage them from voting.

Our next book takes us also into the heart of a teenager. A student at Columbine High School who once wrote in her personal journal, "I am not going



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to apologize for speaking the name of Jesus... If I have to sacrifice everything... I will." While I am not one who readily takes on a book that promises to turn on the tears I was hooked as soon as I began reading. And the tears...well have some tissues close by. Amazon's website describes our next book, *Rachael's Tears*, as follows:

The Columbine tragedy in April 1999 pierced the heart of our country. We later learned that the teenage killers specifically targeted Rachel Scott and mocked her Christian faith on their chilling, homemade videotapes. Rachel Scott died for her faith. Now her parents talk about Rachel's life and how they have found meaning in their daughter's martyrdom in the aftermath of the school shooting.

Rachel's Tears comes from a heartfelt need to celebrate this young girl's life, to work through the grief and the questions of a nation, and to comfort those who have been touched by violence in our schools today. Using excerpts and drawings from Rachel's own journals, her parents offer a spiritual perspective on the Columbine tragedy and provide a vision of hope for preventing youth violence across the nation.



We encourage you to come to our Wednesday gatherings. Our small group hopes to widen our circle and so we hope that you will join in on our discussion. We meet each Wednesday at Noon. Come join us for a light lunch, fellowship and discussion. Our food selections have been fantastic and we always have plenty to share. Trains were not around during the times of the Old Testament prophets but shorts were. So our theme verse uses a pair of shorts as a metaphor for a train wreck — which is in turn our metaphor for a really bad situation that we all would rather avoid. In Jeremiah 13:11 God reveals to the prophet the divine goal: *“Just as shorts fit tightly around the waist, so I intended all the people of Israel and Judah to hold tightly to me. I did this so that they would be my people*

and would bring praise and honor to my name.”

But, the people ignored God’s plan for intimacy and obedience, giving into temptations in the same way that the first couple did in Genesis. God’s message to Jeremiah is to the point: *“But they would not obey me.”* God’s threat that follows from this declaration in Jeremiah sounds a bit harsh. But, God is not happy with the people of Judah because they are chasing after other gods. Sound familiar?

A quick word about what is meant by “other gods” so there is no confusion. In the first of the Ten Commandments God spells out a divine insistence on where our focus belongs. On God and God alone. Worship of any other god is forbidden and a train wreck waiting to happen. What are other gods? The most obvious is money, but other gods include cars, other persons, drugs & alcohol, getting our own way, control, power, and more.

Housing - the Asbury House offers local college students a way to use their gifts and passions together with their faith in building a better neighborhood.

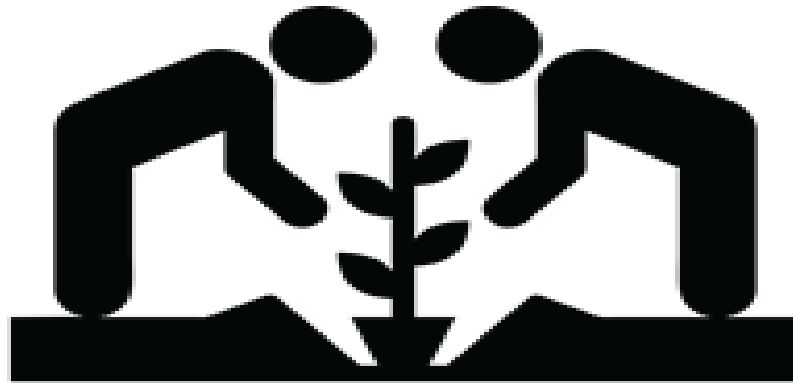
Women’s Circles - The women of Asbury meet regularly in small groups.

In other words, anything that gets in our way of obedience to God.

We can quickly become so busy chasing after other gods we have little time to hear the voice of the One True God. And God tries to warn us we are either too busy to listen or unwilling to be obedient. God will warn us against doing what we are choosing to do if we are headed for a train wreck. Scripture is full of stories that illustrate the consequences. We are like a pair of underwear that gets hidden in a rock. They soon wear out and no longer fit our body. They are ruined. They are a "train wreck."

Like the pair of linen shorts that God told Jeremiah to put in the rocks, should we pursue other gods long enough, we are ruined. Our life becomes a train wreck.

Many of us come to realize that we are like the prophet Isaiah as he came face to face with God's call on his life: "There is no hope for me! I am doomed because every word that passes my lips is sinful, and I live among people whose every word is sinful"

(Isaiah 6:5 GNT).

The prophet encounters God and realizes that he had not obeyed God and lived among people who likewise did not obey God. This is all of us. This leads to a train wreck sooner or later.

Discernment involves a community open to the possibility that God is speaking through actions and decisions all around us. For example, why did our weekly book club small group study a book about democracy? Clearly, our situation in Washington has reached an all-time low, but some question whether the church should take a position on politics? When Jesus said to give to Caesar (government) that which they claim and give to God what God claims was He making a politically neutral statement? Or is Jesus calling it like it is?

Here is a possible discernment: What if God is calling Asbury to become more active in making a political statement of inclusion and democratic process? After all the work that we are doing in our community cannot be done in a vacuum. The City's Master Plan affects our community and the

people we serve. Decisions about land usage, whether we can combine lots, drill wells, eliminate streets and use buildings are all a part of God's plan for good.

Just as shorts fit tightly around the waist, so I intended all the people of Israel and Judah to hold tightly to me. I did this so that they would be my people and would bring praise and honor to my name; but they would not obey me.

Jeremiah 13:11 GNT

God has a plan for Asbury that includes all of us in one way or another. God has a plan for every person and it is a plan for our own good. But unless we are obedient to God's plan we cannot benefit from God's divine favor.
