“Not a problem” you say to yourself. I will just walk a little slower and take more

breaks. Sometime later, you are thirsty and tired, but you notice a lemonade stand on the side of the road with a young boy and his sister sitting behind it. “You thirsty mister” the young girl says to you. “Am I. How much for a big glass?” you ask. Along the way, you meet a group of people. They are distraught. You learn that a fire had devastated their town and they lost everything and are on their way to a place that will provide temporary shelter and help them get back on their feet. Bob, one of the men in the group asks about the rocks in your wagon. When you explain how you are serving God Bob is amazed and swings his backpack and places it on the ground. “I’ve got something to show you,” Bob blurts out in his excitement.

He takes two rocks that are similar to the three that you have in your wagon. Bob says to you, “I too was asked to take these rocks up this hill but I won’t be able to do it. Will you take them up the hill for me?” Excited to help you respond “Of course. Put them right next to the other rocks.” The

group leaves on their way and so do you, but you notice that your wagon is quite a bit harder to pull than it was before adding the additional rocks.

While you are enjoying your refreshing lemonade you notice the young boy trying to turn over a bag of rocks that look too heavy for him to lift. “What are the rocks for?” you ask curious that rocks keep coming up. “Oh this bag of rocks was left here by a woman who said that she was supposed to take them up the hill for God” the boy responds.

Now your curiosity is really peaked. There is another person carrying rocks up the hill for God. “I must find her” you say to yourself. “Where did she go?” you ask the boy’s sister thinking that she is more likely to know. “She left a while ago walking back down the hill and told us to keep the rocks” the girl replied. Knowing the importance that God puts on things getting done you ask “Is it ok if I take the rocks with me up the hill? I’m going that way for the same reason and I already have rocks to take up to the top.”

The children agree and you lift the bag of rocks off their table and put them on top

**Asbury Worship Series  
A Heart for Jesus  
Having a Mary Heart in a  
Martha World**

In ancient Israel the people gathered in the tent of meetings for worship. But not everyone gathered. Women in particular were not allowed inside. The closest they could come was to stand outside the door. Have you ever stood outside a door when there was something going on inside? How did you feel? What kept you from going in?

We had an incredible turnout for our Halloween celebration this year. By some estimations 300 to 400 people may have entered the church and made their way to the café. We served just under 200 hot dogs. There was green slime mustard and ketchup along with punch to go with the hotdogs. The line for food was steady.

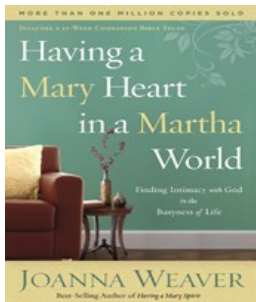


Meanwhile, inside the worship center the music was awesome. God was being honored and gifts were being shared. I know I would have rather spent the entire time listening and worshipping. Surprisingly, at the peak there may have been 100 people at any one time inside the worship center. Most of the time the worship center was less than one quarter full. The vast majority of people chose to stay in the crowded café area for food, getting their picture taken, playing games or just hanging out.

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**Book Club News**

Do you consider yourself a busy person? Are your days generally filled with things to do? Are there some days where you feel like you are falling further behind? These are questions that according to the author of our next book could be proceeded with "You may be a Martha if..." Perhaps you not a Martha-type. Instead of busyness that never ends you take time to "smell the roses" and talk to strangers and manage to be the target of rolling eyes and harsh comments about not doing your share of the chores. Well, "You might be a Mary if..."



10:38–42, John 11:1–44, and John 12:1–11. Scholars suspect that Jesus frequently stayed with the two sisters and their brother Lazarus, but these are the three stories of Jesus visiting them that we find in scripture. One thing is clear in terms of their type-casting, Mary is not Martha and Martha is not Mary. They are two very different people who both want to know and serve Jesus Christ.

This study offers an invitation for everyone of us who feels like we just aren't godly enough... or loving enough... or that we just aren't doing enough. Our lives today really are not all that different from that of Mary and Martha in the New Testament. Like Mary, don't you also long to sit at the Lord's feet... but the daily demands of a busy world just won't leave you alone? Like Martha, don't you love Jesus and really want to serve Him... yet don't you often struggle with weariness, resentment, and feelings of inadequacy?

On Wednesday, October 31, we begin our next book titled *Having a Mary Heart in a Martha World*. Mary and Martha are named in the Gospels in three places: Luke

Just like the story told by Luke, Jesus comes right into the midst of your busy Mary/Martha life and extends the same

invitation He issued long ago to the two sisters of Bethany. Tenderly He invites you to choose "the better part" of life. A joyful life of "living-room" intimacy with Him. An intimacy that flows naturally into serving Him. Come learn how can you make that choice. In this study we will learn how all of us, Marys and Marthas alike, can draw closer to Jesus Christ, deepening our devotion, strengthening our service, and doing both with less stress and greater joy.

Author Joanna Weaver' book has sold over a million copies and her books and Bible studies have been used by hundreds of churches, life groups and individuals. Our time with Joanna's book will be guided using a ten week study guide that she provides along with short video clips from her companion DVD. Joanna is the mother of three children and the wife of a pastor in Montana so she has plenty of experience in the church environment. While this book is written from a woman's perspective the story and lessons are equally applicable to all gender identities.

We encourage you to come to our Wednesday gatherings. Our small group hopes to widen our circle and so we hope that you will join in on our discussion. We meet each Wednesday at Noon. Come join us for a light lunch, fellowship and discussion. Our food selections have been fantastic and we always have plenty to share.
