#### Fake News (The Woven Eternal Truth)

Planning for Easter Sunday this year is a lot different. Like plans for celebrating birthdays and other milestone events, in-person gatherings are a terrible idea. I suspect a lot of pastors worry that Easter may come and go unnoticed.



I struggled in my articulation of this week's message. I struggled with writing down the connection that I'm feeling between that first Easter morning and this coming Easter morning. But when I read the gospel story, I hear echoes of daily news stories captured in the story of that first Easter.

We all know the story. But like all stories, there are the stories behind the headlines. And in the case of the first Easter, the caption, EMPTY TOMB, isn't the whole story. As miraculous as this story is, headlines fade away. But some stories change the course of history. Like the story, you and I are living right now.

Two Thousand years ago, we didn't have the NY Times or CNN, and we didn't have iPhones to record the action as it happened. Lies and cover-ups about what really happened may have ruled the day, were it not for a handful of faithful, ordinary people. Witnesses willing to share what they knew to be true. Those protecting

their interest, who were responsible for Jesus' death, saw the truth differently. So did their co-conspirators.

After the execution of Jesus, the local authorities went to the person in charge of ruling Palestine to convince him that a conspiracy was underway. The chief priests and the Pharisees met with Pilate. They said, "Sir, we remember that while that liar was still alive, he said, 'I will be raised to life three days later.' Give orders to guard his tomb until the third day. So that his disciples will not be able to go and steal the body, and then tell the people that he was raised from death. This last lie would be even worse than the first one" (Matthew 27:62-64).

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I feel blessed that the persons living in the same house as me mostly agree. And that we try to respect each other's viewpoint on the issues that could divide us. But each day brings its own challenges, its own rumors, and a lot of the same as yesterday.

Pastor Jeremy of Court Street Church plans to carry on a conversation with his faith community about grace. Not the grace that describes how people move, but the grace that causes us to cut some slack, even for people who don't deserve it. As I read his reflections on this topic, I was amazed by the relevance of the subject matter to our new series. Grace is a condiment that needs to be on every table for every meal. And in every household.

In fact, grace is an essential ingredient for all human endeavors. Grace is particularly crucial when it comes to determining policy that affects a large number of people. We expect leaders to be superheroes, or at least we hope they can be. But this may be more true if the leader is someone we admire. Yet we all should hope that God extends grace to us.

Jesus has His hands full when it comes to teaching followers a

new way to see other people. On one occasion, John, one of HIs first followers, was bragging about shutting down a group that was helping others. The problem, according to John, wasn't the good they were doing, but the use of Jesus' name as a source of authority. "He's not one of us," John added.

I'm guessing that John anticipated that Jesus would thank him for his outspokenness. But instead, Jesus told John that what he did was wrong. "Don't try to stop him," Jesus responded, "whoever is not against you is for you." An interesting choice of words with several options for interpretation. This is where the subject of grace is helpful.

Jesus was silenced by people in power with a vested interest in keeping His story from becoming headlines. Grace is not something we earn. It is more like the opposite. We give and receive without merit. Whether the other person clearly deserves the slack, we offer them, or they clearly don't. We extend grace either way. Earning grace is not a part of the conversation. It just comes with the way we respond to the world. And if we aren't sure we want to offer grace, we remember the grace that we receive from God.

We begin our new series this Sunday, *Risen*. And our series is not about grace per se. Our plan is to promote conversations about inequality. Particularly, disparities highlighted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Conversations that can divide us, if grace isn't present at all times. So this Sunday, we begin by talking about grace, and about what it means to work together.

Attacking the character of an antagonist is as old as Cain's denial of what happened to his brother Abel. Claiming that a lie is true is a modern-day tactic to try and write the narrative and sway public opinion. Calling any news source that disagrees with what you want to be heard as truth, fake news is today's way of influencing popular opinion away from reality.

I know you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has been raised, just as he said.

Matthew 28: 5-6

Death has a way of uncovering raw truth. As families, hospitals, states, and countries compete for supplies to fight COVID-19, the truth about how the world still works today unfolds in real-time. But if not for dedicated news journalists digging past prepared statements and rhetoric, the story behind the story gets covered up.

The vast separation between access to resources by people of privilege and the lack of access by people that are not privileged is enormous. The primary way of evaluating income inequality is called the Gini Coefficient. This measure calculates

a score that reflects the distribution of income. The score uses fractions on a scale of zero to one, where zero means that everyone earns exactly the same income. A score of one means the wealthiest person receives all of the income. The Gini Coefficient for the United States is higher than nearly all other countries.

The article argued that the spread of the coronavirus brought to light the connection between severity of impact and economic inequity. And the reality is that those of us nearer the bottom of the economic ladder are more likely to catch the disease, and also likelier to die from it.

And those who manage to remain healthy are likelier to suffer loss of income or healthy care as a result of quarantines and other measures. But the bad news spills over economic boundaries. Past research on influenza found that in an epidemic, poverty and inequality can exacerbate rates of transmission and mortality for everyone.

Our reactions to the COVID-19 pandemic certainly sheds light on the diversity of human nature. Our fall back labels, characterizations, presumptions, and the like, shatter under such stress. Instead, those characteristics which determine heroism and effective leadership become clearer. Rhetoric gets exposed for just what it is—thin layers of misrepresentation of facts.

Cowardliness and incompetence also share the spotlight. Along with years of allowing greed to determine policy. The competition for supplies is exposing systemic inequalities all over the world. Families, cities, states, hospitals, and countries are competing for life saving supplies. Money and influence uses power to competitive advantage. We all lose.

In our next series, *Risen*, we dig deeper into the inequalities that the COVID-19 pandemic is uncovering, and challenge ourselves to be among the ordinary, faithful people that keep the truth alive. How do our beliefs translate into actions? What difference can a few, faithful, but ordinary witnesses make?

The income and wealth gap between rich and poor is as old as trade itself. And it was a frequent topic for Jesus during His public ministry. Jesus chose to live among the poor and challenge the systemic policies and people that created and perpetuated inequality. And His insistence on justice led to His arrest and execution.

The news that some groups of people can escape the threat of this deadly virus due to privilege is "in your face" evident. So much that even the repetition of carefully worded slogans cannot stop the truth from coming through. Nor can denigrating antagonists by calling them names. The truth will prevail, provided a handful of faithful, ordinary people are willing to share what they know to be true.

Joel McKerrow, in his book Woven, shares how his spiritual journey from sculpted to unraveled to woven, helped him to see his own hypocrisy.

<sup>1</sup> His own unraveling began when he realized the hypocrisy buried in his religious beliefs. His re-weaving started when he realized that his privilege blinded him from the raw truth that Jesus stood in the gap between privilege and lack of privilege was deadly.

Last week, our message focused on how our stories are woven together with the larger story of salvation. In this week's message, we focus on how being woven together from pieces of our own stories with a greater story, reveals the truth even amid lies and cover-ups. We know why the tomb was empty. And we know that divine justice gets revealed through our testimony. Jesus was silenced by people in power with a vested interest in keeping His story from becoming headlines. But the story of Jesus was no ordinary story. If God chose to live among people today, there would be daily news stories tracking every statement. But what if once again God chose to stand in the gap between rich and poor? What if God chose to fight for closing the gap between privilege and the lack of privilege?

What if God chose to bless the frontline workers that help us check out at the grocery store, pick up our trash, or hand us our carryout order? What if God made sure the needs of the healthcare workers were met, making safety equipment out of ordinary materials, and delivering protective masks to friends who had none? What if God spoke out against the abuse of power that sets privilege against poverty?

Jesus was silenced by people in power with a vested interest in keeping His story from becoming headlines.

Would God's story have a similar ending as it did that first Easter? Would our Lord be hauled before the Federal Courts for disloyalty to government and executed for insurrection? And would the powerful try to cover-up the naked truth that God sides with the disenfranchised and opposes the use of wealth to divide us?

### SIGN UP ... YOU WILL BE GLAD YOU DID! Why the Daniel Plan is so important ...

I have never met Pastor Steve Willis. But there is something that he said that is haunting me. And I hope that it will haunt you too. Pastor Steve's call to action is powerful, timely, and the shoe surely fits our community. We were poisoned by our public water system. But we can recover. Our children can recover. But the problem, at this point, is not someone else's problem. It is our problem. We have the solution and Pastor Steve's challenge is a call to step up and do something about hour health.

The fight for good nutrition was never more real to me than when I watched my kindergarten-aged son struggle with adapting to his physician-prescribed, mind-altering drugs. Lucas had been having discipline problems in school, would frequently struggle with the ability to focus on tasks at hand, and found himself well below grade level in many academic areas...This is more than a health issue; it is a social justice issue. Millions of our children are not reaching their God-given potential because we, as adults, won't take the steps necessary to get them the nutrition they need. For the church, this problem has to be seen as a moral issue. For the sake of our children and our nation's future, we have to do better. 1

Lagree. We have to do better. Teachers, healthcare professionals, counselors, clergy, and others are anticipating the first part of Pastor Steve's story to be a common story. Children with higher concentrations of lead in their bodies are prone to exhibiting behaviors that are not conducive to learning, including lower cognition. The only known solution is available to us. But not in a drivethrough or at a liquor store.

But how is a community that sits in the middle of one of the least healthy counties in Michigan going to be able to regroup and move forward with the necessary changes to help ourselves and our children?

First, we are going to admit that we are incapable. We are going to stop making excuses for ourselves. We are going to guit pointing to some other power, whether it is the force, the ineffective excuse, "I'm spiritual, but I don't go to church" and the hundreds of other absurd claims that I hear every year as to why I don't see people on

Sunday mornings. We are going to repent — that is, we are going to change. Our lives matter. Our children's lives matter.

Faith, Friends, Fitness, Food and Focus

I found myself making a declaration this past week that I have declared before. I wrote and said that responding to God's will for our lives is a human right. And as a human right, we need to treat this right in the same way that we protect other human rights. But it is very difficult to respond to God's purpose for us when our health is less than it needs to be. The Daniel Plan is not the solution on its own, but it is a roadmap that points to and can help us pursue the solution. But the solution begins with God. Without God's power any plan is a non-starter.

By the way, Pastor Steve's son, Lucas, soon was off the drugs and today he is an A student. This story is not a one-of-a-kind, never to be repeated miracle. It is the sort of miracle that God offers every one of us. It is the miracle of making better choices. It is the miracle of taking care of ourselves and each other.

Make a New Year's Resolution for 2020 to commit to The Daniel Plan.

We will begin on Sunday, December 29, by writing down a resolution for 2020. For most of us, our resolution will begin in the same way. "In 2020 I will make my health and well-being a priority by participating in the Daniel Plan." And then we will write down a goal for each of the five areas: faith, food, friends, fitness, and focus. During the first five weeks of 2020, we will learn about each of the pillars of success, possibly modify our goals, and meet regu-

larly with others who have made this same New Year's Resolution.

Join us each Sunday and invite your friends and neighbors. I lead a short Bible study in the Asbury Café at 9:30 am. Dusty 2.0, the musical, will be performed on Christmas Eve at 6 pm. We are praying for a big turnout, and that most of our visitors will return to participate in the Daniel Plan.
