There are many ways of characterizing the year 2020, but the word stability doesn't belong in the final cut. The words uncertainty and unstable are more accurate choices.




Another word that kept try-

## Hope in an Unstable World... Asbury Worship Series

But by the fall, just in time for Thanksgiving, the numbers began to surge, just as healthcare experts warned they would without cooperation lead by stable, consistent, and competent leadership. By Christmas, my hope focused on what it means when I tell people that Jesus saves, in light of so much instability.

On January 20, our country will witness the swearing in of our 46th President. His administration faces the daunting task of reuniting our divided nation together. Yet tens of millions of voters are worried that their aspirations for our country will fall by the wayside. And depending on the outcome of Senate races in Georgia, we could see a prolonged stalemate in congress.

So how do we find hope in an unstable world? For me, I look for stories in scripture that reflect the issues of our present time. My experience is that I can find assurances that God isn't sitting on the sidelines, waiting to see what happens in any particular election. I believe that God continues to move us toward reconciliation with each other and with God, regardless of who we elect. The question is whether we are open to divine guidance or want to go it on our own. Talk about instability.

As we move into 2021, we begin the New Year with a series that opens our minds to the ideas found in the Book of the Prophet, Jeremiah. This book tells about God's urging the people of his time to have hope amid instability. Jeremiah was known as the "weeping prophet" because of his role in sharing God's divine warnings to a people distracted by materialism, economic crisis, and politics. Yet, we find great hope in God's love for humankind.

A lot of us turn to God when it comes to our more difficult choices. The hurdle for whether we look for God's input on a decision varies. Some of us figure God is too busy except for the most life-changing decisions. Others go to God before they head out of the house each day. Most of us grow impatient when we aren't sure if God plans to offer a divine perspective on a particular matter of importance to us.

Where do you fit? What decisions are you hoping God will help you make?

The heaviness of any particular decision is influenced most by the consequences of the decision. Whenever I'm having difficulty deciding what to have for supper I try to remember that I eat meals everyday. But decisions like whether to move to another state have considerably higher stakes. My children live in Michigan because this is where they grew up. Michigan is home for them. Yet, I chose to move to Michigan as a young adult. My choice had consequences spanning generations.

Our series for January focuses on the stories of the prophet Jeremiah. He lived during a time of economic, political, and religious instability. During his lifetime, the country where Jeremiah lived was invaded by a world power and most of the people taken into exile. It's no wonder that Jeremiah was known as the "weeping" prophet.


During this series we learn from Jeremiah by examining several themes that characterize the stories of his time. Our first episode of this month's series deals with life-changing, big consequential decisions that we hope God will weigh in on. Jeremiah, decided to let God choose his career for him. And at times, he regretted his decision, got angry with God, and threatened to quit.

Jeremiah's story begins with his first encounter with God on the subject of his career. Jeremiah was young — likely a teenager when God asked him to take on a high-risk assignment. Jeremiah would face criticism, rejection, death-threats, and risk dying in prison or worse. This is not the sort of job that most of us aspire to when we plan our careers.

First, you may find it help-ful to know that God doesn't speak to us in an audible voice very often. At times, I wonder whether this ever really happens at all. I know that when I say "God spoke to me" I'm not referring to a voice coming out of the clouds, or a burning bush, or that I heard an audible voice at all. But when I realize that God is speaking I'm overwhelmed with emotion and awestruck.

Jeremiah's assignment was to tell the people in his community that God's patience had run out. The economic, political, and religious instability that prevailed were consequences of ignoring God's expectations.

And if they were too thick-headed to stop, bad things were going to happen. It's frightening to compare what is going on in our country with the situation of Jeremiah's time. The parallels are close enough that we can learn a great deal from their mistakes.

I need to take a few sentences to talk about free-will. I chose to use language that suggests choice for a reason. We do have a choice whether we accept God's input, considering it to be advice, or we recognize that while God's input is "technically" advice, ignoring God comes with dire consequences.

It's a good idea not to walk out in front of a truck, but we have a choice. We can live another day or end our life as roadkill. God's will is more than just "advice" because God actually knows which choice is good for us. Ignoring God's will is like walking out in front of a truck.

God said to Jeremiah, "I chose you before I gave you life, and before you were born I selected you." And Jeremiah responded, "Well, when You put it that way, of course I'll do what You ask." Of course not! Jeremiah was a teenager. He had his own idea of what he wanted to do. God was intervening into his well planned life. Jeremiah, using logic to prove his point, replied, "I don't know how to speak; I am too young."

Jeremiah, like so many since him, was blessed to learn quickly that each of us have a choice. We can do things our way, and accept the consequences of a less satisfying life; or we can surrender our will to God's plan. The plan that came with our "user manual". And this choice lets us live knowing that

whatever life gives us, we are much better off than had we chose to ianore God.

I chose you before I gave you life, and before you were born I selected you. Jeremiah 1:5

By the way, God knows our ready -made excuses before they leave our lips. As Jeremiah pondered his next response, God touched Jeremiah's lips and said this, "Listen, I am giving you the words you must speak."

The reason that God's plans for our lives suit us so well is that God blesses us with all that we need to do what we're asked to do. Sometimes these are abilities that come natural to us. Other times, God intervenes when we are confronted with resistance from persons who chose their own path. Melissa Spoelstra, in her book, Jeremiah: Daring to Hope in an Unstable World, writes that making a decision to seek and follow God's plan for us is "not a 'one-time' salvation experience." Rather, each day we are faced with decisions that can derail our faithfulness to God's plan.

Our nation is ideologically divided. The extremists on both sides insist that we choose sides and fight against the others who chose the other side of any particular arguments. God takes sides also. Just as God did when Babylon attacked Jeremiah's country. God took the side of allowing Jeremiah's community to suffer the consequences of their

choices.

Scripture isn't silent on the political, economic, and religious issues of our time. And many of the arguments that we hear come out of individuals reading what they want to read because it confirms what they choose to believe. This doesn't make it God's will or God's choice. It's their choice, but it's God's truck. And Jeremiah's job was to warn them that they were about to get run over.

The first five commandments focus on our relationship with God, with the fifth commandment acting as a transition from God as the parent of creation and respecting the role of those that shaped us growing up. And perhaps we show our greatest respect when we recognize that those that came before us made plenty of mistakes and miscalculations. Our job is to do better while realizing that we'll make different mistakes and miscalculations left for our children to overcome.

There is a sense of priority among the items in this list. But there is a better sense that this list sets apart from all other notions of right versus wrong—a starting point for living according to our Creator God's intentions. Whatever rules, laws, expectations, and requirements we may choose to follow, build on, and carries out this list — only with more specificity.

The Ten Commandments begin with our total allegiance to God. Allowing any person, object, or desire to take our attention away from God is the starting point for destruction. It's all downhill and out of control from there—a subtle but powerful realization. There are no other people, places, or things that are more important than God. Sounds simple enough, but we fail in these first two commandments time after time.

We live in a "have it my way" era where distractions are everywhere. I don't know about you, but my experience is that I don't always choose wisely when I can have it my way. I fall prey to the advertised outcomes that turn out to be false. And I eventually fail to recognize that my desires get in the way of my devotion to God. I settle for cheap substitutes that I'm unwilling to give up for the real thing.

The stories of the liberation of the Hebrew people from slavery in Egypt include an illustration of the people turning to an imitation. The people created a golden calf and gave it an importance that displaced their allegiance to God (Exodus 32).

Do you think that my Temple is a hiding place for robbers?

Jeremiah 7:11

History repeated itself during the generation when the prophet Jeremiah lived. Only this time, it wasn't a golden calf that displaced God. This time the people would tell lies when it was advantageous, steal from one another, and give allegiance to a power contrary to God. But then they would go to church and act like they were faithful followers. Sound familiar?

Many of us will grab hold of promises that prove to be counterfeit. We try to appease a yearning deep inside of us with substitutes. We buy a new toy, eat more than we need, drink or smoke to relieve anxiety, or worse. And we're never satisfied. But our addictions argue that if we buy more, eat more, drink more, or whatever our substitute of choice might be, we eventually will find satisfaction.

But this yearning can never be satisfied by humanmade objects, regardless of their empirical value. The genuine article is the love we feel for Christ when we surrender our life to God entirely. Our human-made objects are tools that we can use in service the One True God. But how we respond to God's love illustrates whether our loyalty is itself counterfeit.

God, speaking through the prophet Jeremiah asked this powerful question. "Do you think that my Temple is a hiding place for robbers?" (Jeremiah 7:11). The prophet went to the entrance of the local church to share

God's warning with the people. Stop what you're doing. Stop lying, cheating each other, and allowing the killing of innocent people.

My hope for 2021 is that the messages that played out in the streets of cities around the world will move us to action. We saw the way that law enforcement and the National Guard dispersed the crowd that stormed the U.S. Capital building. We saw how this differed in how law enforcement and militia dispersed protestors that carried the message that black lives matter.

We see the reactions with lethal force towards black and brown bodies in situation after situation. And we see people gather in churches afterward looking to find safety from an angry God.

Throughout the Book of Jeremiah, God reminded the people then, and God reminds us today, that it's not too late. God is as merciful as God is powerful. And God is calling us today to turn away from whatever is keeping us from carrying God's love to the world.
