The Force (What is belief?)



Luke Skywalker had to learn to harness the power of the force to become a Jedi Knight. The force was a mysterious, omnipresent spirit that connected Luke to the collective power of the galaxy. Unfortunately, the force could be harnessed for both good and evil.

George Lucas, the creator of the Star Wars franchise, stated that the force "evolved out of various developments of character and plot." Lucas claims his goal was to create a concept familiar to several religions based on the premise that God exists.

The force succeeded as a common primitive desire to access a power greater than the challenges we face. The force itself had no moral compass. Instead, it was raw

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energy that exists because we exist. Not surprisingly, however, only a small number of characters can tap into the power of the force whose characters evolve into superheroes and villains.

Ironically, in return, the force directed the actions of those granted supernatural power, implying that the force had a will of its own. However, what's behind the will of the force remains a mystery.

Meanwhile, outside cinema fantasy, we catch a glimpse of power similar to the force.

For example, an attacker using a large knife injured three police officers on New Year's Eve. This attack caught my attention and started my exploration down memory lane of the force. Law enforcement's investigation uncovered that the attacker targeted police officers in response to influences motivated by a radical religious group.

My mind constructed a connection between using religious beliefs to motivate harm toward others and the concept of the force. This helped me rationalize how religious leaders conclude that God empowers them to perpetrate violence against others.

In this case, I'm not referring to a domesticated version of the

force coming out of the creative genius of George Lucas. However, the results of individuals assessing this force are projected in spectacular scenes for our viewing pleasure. Instead, this force is more powerful and deadly. And it has been used for centuries by humans to manipulate others to commit acts offensive to God.

Admittedly, I'm not bothered by the language of the force depicted in Star Wars, even in a religious context. After all, there are a few similarities between the force in Star Wars, the real world, and the Holy Spirit of God. In all of these cases, we're made aware of the connectedness between us. I see this as a starting point that is healthier than isolationism.

Lately, I've been thinking a lot about our role as Christians and my role as a religious leader in public discourse about violence. I admire the clergy who lead protests that speak out against systems that perpetuate violence. The violence of racism is particularly deadly and harms both the privileged and the victims.

But what is going on in the churches located in Russia? Are the religious leaders finding a way to justify the heinous actions of the Russian political leaders? Reuters reported that the head of the Russian Orthodox Church, Patriarch Kirill, supported the war against Ukraine and called for church leaders and members to

support Putin in the murdering of innocent civilians. Of course, he used "church" language that sanitized and justified brutality.

Is this utilizing the force for evil? I can't make any rational connection to God's will. I don't want to be associated with a church led by an individual justifying murder, regardless of their argument.

Similarly, religious leaders claiming that God condones terrorism seem more connected to the force of evil than to divine power.

The force is a human-made construct that captures the motivations of any seeking to wield power beyond human ability. While this may be a starting point for conversations about belief in God, the force won't take us very far into the truth of God.

The Bible has its own depiction of a divine Force with supernatural power. And tapping into this Force also begins with the belief that God exists. But there is more to it than simply acknowledging God exists.

In the Letter of James, we're reminded that even demons believe there is only One God. But their head knowledge creates fear within them. Fear rather than humility and resentment more so than awe.

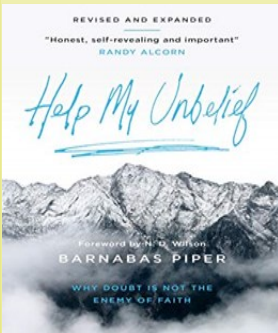

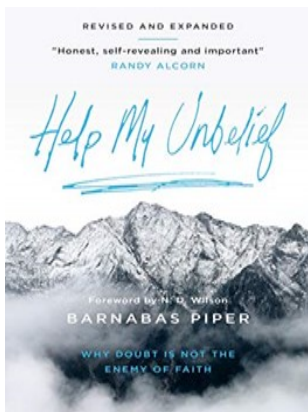

Instead, it was a matter of shifting priorities. God became less important than my ambitions. I tried to keep this shift a secret while not realizing that it's obvious when this happens. And God knows long before we realize it ourselves.

Scripture is full of stories about this happening to people. The results are never good. However, God does not give up on anyone. Some of us are slow learners, and it takes a lifetime to figure it out. Sadly, too many never do and miss out on the joy that accompanies trusting God with everything.

Our new series is based on a book by Barnabas Piper titled *Help My Unbelief*. In his book, he shares his personal journey with doubt and unbelief. And you and I gain insight into what faith really means.

The book title comes from a story found in the Gospel of Mark. A man brings his son, hoping to find a cure for his son's convulsions. When Jesus confronts the man about whether he genuinely believed that his son could be healed, the man asks Jesus, "I do believe; help my unbelief!" (Mark 9:14-29).

It turns out that embracing doubts and questions can help us to get to know God better. So our hope for this series is that each of us will come to trust God in our everyday lives. Even when we don't understand everything we may want to know.

Fortunately, God never gives up on us. N. D. Wilson writes in his forward for the book that "When we cannot see, we are still seen." Jesus searches for the lost in the same way a Shepherd never gives up until a lost sheep is found.

We kick off 2023 with a dive into a struggle that is common to all believers, doubt. Few of us call our condition unbelief. But our unwillingness to be honest with ourselves does not change reality. Until and unless we fully trust God with every aspect of our lives, unbelief has a grip on us.

that sticks to the farmer's boot like manure in the barnyard. Clay is obstinate and challenging. And water doesn't easily pass through dense clay.

Yep, this description nails it, but doesn't sound much like "Jesus loves me!" does it?

Speaking through the Prophet Jeremiah, God offers pottery as a metaphor but doesn't offer much clarification. "Go to the potter's house," God instructs Jeremiah. And while observing the potter along with Jeremiah, we gain insight into God's way of seeing creation.

Like the potter, God shapes mud into art. Like mud, we are shaped through life circumstances, mainly due to choices made by persons we've never met and can't hold accountable.

Scripture is clear. It works this way on purpose. While we're each made from mud, we're all mixtures of different types and shades of mud. God throws a lump onto the wheel that begins the creative process. Some of us are porous, while others are less so. Some of us come from primary sources where stone was crushed into clay. Others are made from clay that traveled downstream, picking up impurities along the way.

Potters often mix clays with different characteristics, resulting in a more durable and beautiful piece of art. For example, adding clay with more plasticity improves a very dense clay that withstands high temperatures and finishes harder and stronger.

The Lord said go to the potter's house...whenever a piece of pottery turned out imperfect, he would take the clay and make it into something else.

Jeremiah 18:1-8

And, as a potter, God knows that we each tolerate different levels of hardening and heat. Likewise, some of us are easily molded and shaped, while others are stubborn and resist shaping. Nevertheless, we each become what the Potter chooses us to be, whether by intervention or through the consequences of choices made by persons closely connected and by many we'll never meet.

On the other hand, even though the story's point in Jeremiah is subtle, it's powerful. The miracle is found in the language describing how the potter reacts to a misshaped lump of clay. The potter makes something else, not rejecting or abandoning the clay, but working with the raw material to change what is misshaped into beautiful art.

This sounds more like Jesus loves me but recognizes what I'm trying to hide.

In the Book of Job, we read a story that invites us up on stage. Job's story is our story when things aren't going so well. Like Job, we want to know why calamity happened to us. What did we do that was so terrible? Why are we being punished? And God is often silent?

But what if God decided to answer us? God enters the final scene in Job's case, but the answer isn't what Job expected. So, God has answered already in scripture.

More importantly, God sometimes answers through our connection with others and often through a tiny opening in our souls. Sometimes, despite our rigidity and stubbornness, God makes way for life-giving and life-changing revelation.

Can you tie together the themes from Jeremiah and Job for yourself? In what ways is God answering you? Is God silent? Share how you are coping?
3. How can the members of your group help you this week and on-going to help you to be more receptive to hearing and understanding the Word of God? Pray for each other to have the Holy Spirit bless you with more courage.

A meal goes a long way for a senior living alone, a family struggling to make ends meet, or a child fearful of empty shelves at home. But for the residents of Flint who carry the effects of lead-tainted water, nutrition is critical. Asbury Farms provides locally grown produce used to create fabulous and nutritious meals. Our seed-to-table approach is community-based. This not only helps families make it through emergencies and crises. We help move families towards sustainable abundance.

Our Sizzling Culture program provides jobs and new skills to our city's youth. This includes year-round employment. Our staff and most of our volunteers come from the neighborhoods we support. We call this sustainable abundance because families move from need-based on scarcity to enough based on community-generated abundance.

Our work is also about food and justice. Our vision is a revitalized community where every resident can use their talents and passions for the common good, where children grow into active citizens. And all residents can enjoy safety, good health, and a culture that fosters life-long learning and satisfying lives. This summer, help us address food insecurity and strengthen Flint's budding local food system by supporting the Feed Flint campaign.
