The Revelation (Who Dunnit?)



As we come to the final episode of our series, *Who dunnit?*, it's time to wrap up. Ending a story is a challenge all storytellers face. How should we end our mystery?

Our investigation into the case of who killed Jesus concluded last week with naming the governor, Pontius Pilate, as the person guilty. He was the only suspect with both

motivation and means. It was the governor who made the final decision.

But along the way, we discovered a lot of guilt and very little innocence. This means the mystery mirrors many destructive decisions in life.

Ignoring the advice of experts, we're now in the midst of a global trade war with every country except Russia. The markets have plummeted after dismantling centuries of investment in goodwill and trust of the U.S. by the rest of the world.

Anyone who is in the U.S. legally but not a citizen is understandably fearful to speak out in opposition to the administration and risk arrest and transfer to a foreign prison without due process. Many fear that free speech is at risk for all Americans.

Numerous clergy and religious leaders defend and support the current administration's decisions and policies. Their support implies that our country is on a biblically defensible course. But is it?

Are our country's policies consistent with the teachings of Jesus, or are we more in harmony with the numerous characters who conspired to put Jesus to death?

There were plenty of people who conspired to kill Jesus. The list of suspects is large, including Herod, the people of Nazareth, the clergy, and the disciple Judas. They all had motives to kill Jesus, but none of them is the guilty party in

the gospel story. Only one person had the means. Ultimately, it was Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor, who decided Jesus would die on the cross.

The reality is that none of the Jewish enemies of Jesus had the power to put Jesus to death on the cross. Even though John's gospel refers to persons who opposed Jesus as "the Jews," John mostly uses this term to refer to religious leaders specifically. We sometimes forget Jesus is Jewish, and in the beginning of the Christian faith, nearly all of the followers of Jesus were Jewish.

As the gospel spread, the church moved further away from its Jewish roots. Several aspiring leaders appealed to Roman citizens and authorities by blaming Jews for Jesus' death. As a result, Christians often blamed all Jews for the death of Jesus. The effect was to virtually erase the Jewishness of Jesus.

But even worse, blaming Jews for the death of Jesus led to widespread persecution of people of Jewish descent. The holocaust of the 20th century was a continuation of Christian authorities committing genocide against Jews.

As we confront and confess our violent history, it's important to remember the Jews who wanted Jesus dead were mostly members of a wealthy, powerful elite who felt threatened by Jesus but did not have the power to put Jesus on the cross.

Pontius Pilate is a mysterious figure. We don't know where Pilate came from or what he was doing before he became governor of Judea. However, there are lots of made-up stories about Pilate's early years, invented hundreds of years after the gospels were written.

Historians don't agree whether Pilate was an active governor or inactive. But there is consensus on one thing. Pilate was brutal and had a habit of provoking the Jews.

For example, Pilate once brought flags bearing Caesar's image into Jerusalem. But even more provocative, he later had golden shields proclaiming the emperor's divinity mounted on the walls of the royal palace. Pilate's insensitivity often led to protests that were met with violence.

Upcoming Worship Series "Who Dunnit?





In *Who Dunnit?*, we focus on people who attempted to shorten Jesus's ministry. After all, they represent, in one way or another, the spiritual powers of this world that Jesus encountered in the wilderness.

Let me explain. After His baptism, Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness, where Satan attempted to exploit His human weaknesses. During Lent, we are asked to reflect on our temptations and how God may call us to respond.

The people who tried to kill Jesus were consumed by selfish desires. The desire for comfort, desire for power, and desire glory. Many believed Jesus had to die because He

refused to play the game, and in doing so, he exposed the hypocrisy of those who claimed to know God and live accordingly.

In this series, we will learn about the people who wanted Jesus dead, and we will discover that God is calling us still to resist the powers that conspired to put Jesus on the cross.

We'll use *The Friends and Foes of Jesus* for a companion book by Dr. Peter DeHaan. Our author says he often makes religious people squirm, but spiritual seekers cheer. He's not trying to be provocative, he says, but he seeks truth. And the truth makes some people uncomfortable.

Reading from our companion book is divided into mostly equal pages each week. Since our companion book is a whirlwind tour of dozens of names, our series won't connect directly. However, we'll have an opportunity to consider how the messages each week inform our understanding of each person's view of Jesus.

- 3. How can your group members help you be more receptive to hearing and understanding the Word of God this week? Pray for each other to have the Holy Spirit bless you with more courage.



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

The gospels portray Pilate as reluctant to put Jesus to death. He gives the people an opportunity to vote for His freedom. On the other hand, Pilate rarely hesitated to order the execution of Jewish prisoners. It's possible that the gospel emphasis on Pilate's reluctance may be more theological than historical. Nevertheless, it's likely Pilate preferred not to upset the crowds who cheered Jesus when He entered the city and gathered in large numbers to hear Him speak in the temple.

So why did Pilate choose to have Jesus executed?

Perhaps the sign Pilate had placed over Jesus' head offers a clue. The sign read, "King of the Jews." The chief priests tried to convince Pilate to change the wording to, "This man claimed to be the king of the Jews," but Pilate refused.

It seems that Pilate didn't really care about truth, falsehood, guilt, or innocence. What Pilate understood was terror and intimidation. Pilate was fond of reminding the Jews that he held the power of life or death. Should he be sufficiently provoked, Pilate could order the death of everyone in Jerusalem.

Pilate handed Jesus over to them to be crucified.

John 19:16-22

Jesus' execution was another reminder that Pilate represented the Roman Empire. What if the real villain is the empire?

If you recall, Mary and Joseph traveled to Bethlehem because of an Executive Order signed by Caesar Augustus. This led to Herod trying to kill Jesus.

Is it possible that the primary enemy Jesus came to face was any power where people dominate one another? In other words, Jesus came to bring another Way. Jesus came to show us that healing comes from love. And love is more powerful than empire because love would rather die than kill. Jesus shows us a power that would rather serve than command, a power that would rather inspire than dictate.

Jesus, through His life, death, and resurrection, revealed that while the empires of this world may wield the power of death, without love, we can never know the power that leads to Life.

Our series was inspired by The Reverend Jeremy Peters of Court Street United Methodist Church, Flint, Michigan, in collaboration with several United Methodist Pastors serving the Flint area. Pastor Jeremy wrote some of the content. In our next series, *Lifeboat*, we learn about a group of people desperately clinging to life after the yacht they were on sank. Three days after the accident, after drifting a considerable distance from where the boat sank, they pull a stranger into the lifeboat. The stranger claims to be the Lord.

They were in disbelief, although each showed it in a different way. "If you're really the Lord, save us," sums up their collective response. Things didn't add up.

Meanwhile, in our story for this week, Mary Magdalene goes to the tomb where Jesus was buried and discovers that His body is missing. Two angels ask Mary why she is crying. "They have taken my Lord away," she responds.

As she turned around to head away from the tomb, Jesus is standing right in front of her. But she did not know that it was Jesus.

Mary isn't in a lifeboat clinging to life, but she is wondering what will happen now. Although she was a devoted follower of Jesus, she didn't recognize Him at the moment, even though it had been only three days since she had seen Him.

Had Jesus changed? Perhaps it was Mary who wasn't quite ready to see Jesus alive.

A lot is going on in the world. Many of us feel a connection with the survivors in the lifeboat. Most of us can identify with Mary, too. Even if Jesus is standing among us, we either don't recognize Him or don't believe He's around. Because, if he is here, why won't He save us?

The global trade war will raise prices substantially and result in substantial layoffs.
The real truth is only bad news.
The lies coming out of Washington and Fox News are sickening.

People are being arrested and sent to a foreign prison without due process. And when the truth is uncovered, the administration stonewalls, lies, and continues on its way.

Universities and law firms are under attack if they don't fall in line behind the rhetoric. We're learning what it's like for people living under authoritarian dictators, like Putin.

Worse, Republican legislators are afraid to push back. The Supreme Court set us up for a disaster when it ruled that only Congress can rein in the president.

I fee like I am clinging onto life in terms of the future for myself and my family.

Nevertheless, I know Jesus is in the lifeboat with us. But God has a track record of allowing us to suffer the consequences of our collective decisions. And we are suffering from the mistakes made during the last election, regardless of our role.

This is the way lifeboats work.

But Mary had a revelation when Jesus said her name. Something very familiar was present, perhaps the way He said it, the reflection, or the tenderness. I believe Jesus knew what Mary was going through, and she felt it in His voice.

She turned around and saw Jesus standing there but did not know it was Jesus.

John 20:1-25

Mary was in a transitional period in her life. So much had changed, so suddenly, that she couldn't be sure what tomorrow would bring. Mary didn't play a role in the arrest and death of Jesus. But she suffered from decisions made by others. Now what?

Mary's revelation is our revelation. The tomb is empty because Jesus is alive. Once we empty ourselves of our need to cling to life as it may have been or as we believe it should be, Jesus fills us with the joy of life as God intends it to be.

Happy Easter! May you hear Jesus call your name and recognize that He is always with you.

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

I am delighted to inform you about an important new initiative coming to the Flint area, and to ask area faith communities for your help in its launch.

What:

The Children's Grief Center, Great Lakes Bay Region, is helping to establish a new Children's Grief Center in Flint to serve the Genesee County area. The need is enormous for grief support in the Flint/Genesee County area. And due to the abrupt closure last summer of the only free children's grief program in the area, there are very few places for families to seek help--especially help provided at no charge.

Why:

When the previous grief center closed, a group of folks from local hospice companies and funeral homes met together to discuss ways to meet the needs of grieving children and their parents. In the process of gathering information, we learned of the Children's Grief Center based in Midland and contacted them for advice.

The task seemed huge! To replace the previous program, we would need to: create a new non-profit, find a location, raise funds, design a program, recruit and train volunteers, assemble supplies...and we all have full-time jobs. But we decided to take a leap of faith.

The staff at the Children's Grief Center has not only given us great advice...they have graciously offered to help us to open a Genesee County program under the umbrella of their established non-profit organization. They will provide: grant writing services, program materials, volunteer training and help with program oversight.

When:

We hope to begin programming in September 2025. We have secured a location in a church building in Flint Township. We have begun recruiting and training volunteers, and we have reached out to U of M Flint seeking social work and psychology students who could intern with us.

We will start with peer support groups for children from age 5 through high school, as well as their parents/guardians. Our hope is to expand the program to provide grief support groups in local schools within the next couple of years.

What Area Faith Communities Can Do:

1. **Help us locate the righ t volunteers** by publishing the following announcement in your newsletter/bulletins for the next several weeks. (Feel free to use the logo and QR code.)

The Children's Grief Center is seeking volunteers from Genesee County to assist with grief support groups for children ages 5 to 18 and for their parents/guardians. Volunteers will receive thorough training to be well-prepared to walk with families through their loss. All volunteers are asked to commit to two evenings per month for a full school year (fall 2025 through spring 2026). Evening Grief Support programming will begin twice a month in September 2025. If you're interested in learning more, please fill out the volunteer form at www.childrensgriefglbr.org

2. **Help us raise the funds** we need to get started.

We estimate that it will cost about \$2500 per month to provide these programs for families at no charge. This money will cover all program materials and supplies, a free dinner at each meeting (so that families can come straight from work/sports/etc. without worrying about supper), space rental, outreach materials, and staff time. We are currently seeking grant funding for the ongoing program, but we really need some resources to get started.

Please consider ways your congregation might provide a gift to help the Children's Grief Center to get started. We suggest perhaps receiving a special offering for this program on Sunday, June 8 (International Children's Day). To publicize such an offering, you can find lots of helpful information on the Children's Grief Center website.

Another option is to share this need and the web site address with your members through your newsletter/bulletin, allowing them to choose to donate individually if they wish. (Feel free to use the logo and QR code.)
