Children (Lifeboat)



Higher prices on essential items disproportionately affect families with lower incomes more than those with higher incomes. While most of us can put off buying things we can do without, many essentials cannot be delayed for very long. Certainly not long enough for the trade

war levied against the rest of the world to end.

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Fabrication (Lifeboat)



"Fabrication" is used a lot in manufacturing to refer to the process of producing a product. The word refers to the idea of creating something from raw materials. The word also refers to fabricating a story or telling an outright lie. When a person lies, they're often making up a story that is fiction, but could contain

fragments of truth.

This is more common than we would like to admit. The problem is knowing when someone is lying and which parts of their story may be genuine.

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Families living at or below the poverty level feel the effects most, as essentials like food and fuel become increasingly inaccessible, making survival more difficult. The impact is even more severe for children as meals become less frequent, education slips further away, and medical care becomes a luxury many families can't afford.

Childhood poverty is a persistent reminder that the most vulnerable, who also aren't invited to weigh in on policies affecting them, feel the impact first and the hardest. The U.S. has made some progress since the last century, but even this meager progress is at risk.

Head Start was one of numerous programs targeted for elimination. Fortunately, the administration gave in to public pressure and kept it in the current budget proposal. The pressure needs to stay on to protect the most vulnerable of us.

In our reading this week from our companion book, Benji awoke to see that the entire sea was glowing. In places, it looked like a million small light bulbs were illuminating the water. The ocean was completely calm and looked like a massive sheet of glowing glass. It was so beautiful that Benji wondered if he had died and was seeing heaven.

"At that moment," Benji shared, "I sensed my insignificance more than at any other moment in my life." Jean Philippe asked Benji if he thought the stranger had anything to do with creating what they experienced.
"Something must have," Jean Philippe whispered,
"Something magnificent."

The next morning, Jean
Philippe was not in the lifeboat.
In frustration, Benji asked the
stranger why he hadn't stopped
him. "Why didn't you?" the
stranger responded.

The group of survivors had dwindled to four. There was the little girl, Alice, the stranger, Jason Lambert, who owned the Galaxy, and the stranger.

One morning, Benji awoke to Jason Lambert with a knife in his hand and screaming at the

stranger, "Do something, you IDIOT! Call for HELP!" "I am your help, Jason Lambert," the stranger calmly responded, "Come to me." It became clear that the effects of drinking seawater had pushed Jason Lambert over the edge.

In a matter of seconds, both the stranger and Jason Lambert were in the water and dead. Only Alice and Benji remained alive in the lifeboat.



In our worship series, *Lifeboat*, we learn about a group of people desperately clinging to life after the yacht they were on sank. Three days after the accident, after drifting a considerable distance from where the boat went down, they pull a stranger into the lifeboat. The stranger claimed to be the Lord.

In his best-selling novel, *The Stranger in the Lifeboat*, Mitch Album lays out the beginning of the mystery. "When we pulled him from the water, he didn't have a scratch on him ... he was unmarked, with smooth almond skin and thick dark hair matted by seawater ... He wore no life jacket, nor was he holding on to anything when we spotted him bobbing in the waves."

The survivors were baffled by finding someone alive in the chilly waters. One survivor, Nina, said to the stranger, "Well, thank the Lord we found you." The suspense went into hyperdrive when the stranger responded, "I am the Lord."

They were in disbelief, although each showed it differently. "If you' re really the Lord, save us," sums up their collective response. Things didn't add up.

Fortunately, we're not in a lifeboat clinging to life, but most of us wonder what will happen now. A lot is going on in the world. Many of us can feel a connection with the survivors in the lifeboat. We may feel like we're clinging onto life in terms of the future.

But is Jesus really in the lifeboat with us? When we see the mess created by the current administration, we struggle to see the love that Jesus taught. Instead, we see hatefulness, cruelty, revenge, abuse of power, and lawlessness.

When we look at what is happening in our nation, we clearly don't see Jesus. We worry that Jesus is dead, or at least that which Jesus teaches us is dead. Even if Jesus is among us, we either don't recognize Him or don't believe He's around. Because, if he is here, why won't He save us?



Benji had noticed how
Alice seemed to stay close to
the stranger, as if she believed
he would protect her. It reminded him of a time when
their priest shared how Jesus
loved the children and that the
kingdom of Heaven belonged
to them. His mother rubbed
his shoulders. At that moment,
Benji felt sheltered from all evil.

The priest Benji and his mom heard that day could have read from any of the three synoptic gospels. They each share a story about a time when Jesus talked about the importance of children. And that we adults need to have faith more like the faith a child has.

"There is no faith like the faith of a child," Benji shared in his journal, "I have not got the heart to tell Alice it's misplaced.."

The death of the stranger, at the hands of Jaason Lambert, seemed to confirm the doubts Benji had about the stranger's claim to be the Lord. Surely, he must also have felt a loss of hope with the possibilty that the Lord wa with them on the lifeboat now gone.

Remember this! Whoever does not receive the Kingdom of God like a child will never enter it.

Luke 18: 15-17

Children haven't experienced the disappointments most adults have experienced. The loss of loved ones and other tragedies leave us wondering why God allows so much suffering.

When Jesus said we should have faith like a child, He was speaking to people when, culturally, children didn't have the status most children have today. This is hard for me to imagine. And given how much my children matter to me, I can't help but want all children to be loved and cared for.

Nevertheless, it's also hard for any of us to put enough distance between our faith and past experiences to reach the same level of trust that a child puts in persons they count on. Unable to take care of their needs on their own, even the most skeptical children depend on adults for safety and their essential needs.

However, in many families, even providing the essentials is a struggle.

What happens next in our companion book is a cliff-hanger beckoning us to read on. "They' re all gone," Benji said to Alice!" The little girl who hadn't spoken until then replied. "I am the Lord. And I will never leave you."

Our series was inspired by Mitch Albom. *The Stranger in the Lifeboat*. New York: HarperCollins, 2021. Renee Ellory is one of those rare individuals who have a talent for detecting deception. She was among 50 people identified in a University of San Francisco study where scientists aimed to find individuals who excel at accurately spotting lies told by strangers. And the researchers tested over 15,000 people working for the CIA, Secret Service, FBI, sheriffs, psychologists, lawyers, judges, and ordinary people.

In an article titled "The Liar's Projections," Renee writes that if you notice a person accusing everyone else of lying while claiming they're honest, they are likely to be indirectly pointing the finger back at themselves.

In psychology, this phenomenon is known as "projection." In other words, a person who is not telling the truth is projecting their behavior onto others.

Additionally, it's not uncommon for such a person to project onto others the negative behaviors they feel guilty about. Often unaware that this is what is happening.

In this week's chapters from our companion book, *The Stranger in the Lifeboat*, Dobby has shown up on the Island of Montserrat, where Chief Inspector Marty LeFleur is listening to his version of what may have happened to the Galaxy. If you recall, Benji blamed the explosion on his childhood friend. And LeFleur seems convinced of his guilt.

Dobby asks LeFleur if he has ever heard of "confabulation." According to the National Institute of Health, confabulation is a form of neuropsychiatric disorder where a person tells a false story, but without the intention of deceit. The person may be trying to explain what has happened to themselves.

Dobby's explanation seemed too convenient to LeFleur. But Dobby pointed out that Annabelle, Benji's wife to whom his journal was addressed, was no longer living. Perhaps at least some parts of the mystery of what happened to the Galaxy were coming to light. LeFleur's job was to get to the truth.

Truth is a common theme throughout scripture. We're told that God hates lies, even though God loves the person lying. But there are good reasons for the truth. Proverbs tells us, "When you tell the truth, justice is done, but lies lead to injustice (Proverbs 12:17).

We're certainly experiencing the bending of the truth and outright lies coming out of the administration and many lawmakers in Washington. And in many cases, injustice is being covered up rather than telling the truth and undoing the harm.

The current president's propensity for lying is well documented. The Washington Post counted a total of 30,573 lies told during his first term. Interestingly, they noticed that the rate of lies told increased dramatically from year to year.

People lie for a lot of reasons. And often a lie seems justifiable. Dr. Bella DePaulo has done extensive research on lies told by ordinary people. She says we all lie, mainly for two reasons. Either we want something or we want to avoid what we don't want, or we lie for someone else's benefit. DePaulo categorizes these two types of lies as self-serving and kind lies.

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When confronted while Jesus was being interrogated after His arrest, Peter said to the men who were convinced that he was a friend of Jesus. "I swear that I am telling the truth? I do not know that man!" Right after Peter said this, a rooster crowed nearby, reminding him what Jesus had said earlier.

Did Peter do the right thing? After all, he feared being arrested had he admitted to being a follower of Jesus. This way, he was able to continue the mission left to Him by Jesus. However, the guilt of his self-serving lie, in which he denied knowing Jesus, was intense for Peter.

Jesus knew Peter would deny knowing Him when confronted. Likewise, Jesus knows that most of us will make similar decisions. And we do when it comes to using self-serving lies for our own benefit. In John's Gospel, Jesus tells us that to follow Him is to do as He teaches. In other words, we follow His example of treating all persons with dignity and love. This is what it means to be a Christian. And by extension, this means that our policies should reflect Jesus' teachings if we want to be a nation that exemplifies the teachings of Jesus.

You will know the truth, and the truth will set you free.

John 8:31-32

What would be the benefit of a nation whose policies reflect the teachings of Jesus?

Jesus said that when we follow His teachings, we know the truth. And the truth, my friends, will set us free.
