### Heaven Calling (Miracles)



What do you think happens when we die?

Late Show host Stephen
Colbert occasionally asks this
question to guests on his show
in an episode called "The Colbert
Questionert." The celebrities interviewed by Colbert provide a variety of responses, offering a

glimpse into their beliefs.

Most of us believe that there is something after death, but what happens is a mystery. Belief in an afterlife is common globally across nearly all religions.

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The circumstances make
Benji sound like a Psychopath.
According to the staff at Psychology Today, Psychopaths
lack empathy, are often callous
and detached, and may be
highly manipulative. Guilt, on
the other hand, is a normal response to harming others. Benji
felt guilty but still showed empathy towards others.

But it wasn't Benji who sank the Galaxy. The guilt of what he planned to do was too much for Benji. The night of the explosion, Benji decided to jump off the Galaxy to commit suicide, just as three whales rammed the bottom of the yacht, leaving a huge hole.

Dr Lawrence Howells, a
Clinical Psychologist, in an
excerpt from his book published by the British Psychological Society, reminds us that
guilt is more complicated than
other emotions, "because we
have to have a sense of morality, a set of standards or values
we believe we should live up
to."

Psychopaths, on the other hand, are unable to process guilt in the same way as others and operate as though they have no sense of morality, standards, or values we should live up to. Psychopathy is more likely a result of genetics and more challenging to treat than guilt.

After recovering from the initial shock of Alice, the little girl, telling him that she is the Lord, Benji sat quietly, holding her hand. He wrote in his journal, "Holding her hand was like a key turning a tumbler. My body melted. My breath calmed. As the minutes passed, I seemed to get smaller. The heavens grew enormous. When a spread of glowing stars took over the sky, it drew tears from my eyes. I realized this is what it means to forgo everything and be alone with God. And I knew that I was."

What a feeling that must have been, to know that you' re with the Lord in person. The Lord reminded Benji that every moment spent with the people we love is a precious gift, but their death is never a punishment for those left behind.

Then the Lord said,
"Benjamin. I know you before
you are born. I know you after
you die. My plans for you are
not defined by this world. And
because I go on, you go on
with me. Feeling loss is part of

why you are on Earth. Through it, you appreciate the brief gift of human existence, and you learn to cherish the world I created for you."

Then the Lord said, "When people leave this Earth, their loved ones always weep." The Lord smiled and added, "But I promise you, those who leave do not."

Benji's story, told through his journal, helped Inspector LeFleur see the world differently and find peace despite the loss of his daughter, Patrice. "Lilly's all right," LeFleur tells his wife, "She's all right. She's safe."

In our next series, *Heaven*, we'll use one of Mitch Albom's earlier books, *The First Phone Call From Heaven*, as a guide. In his novel, Albom allows us to imagine what it might be like to hear firsthand testimony from others who are in heaven.

As the companion book for this series ends, Benji's conversation with the Lord comes to an end, as he asks, "What do I do now?" The Lord responded, "Forgive yourself. Then use this grace to spread my spirit."



In our worship series, *Lifeboat*, we learn about a group of people desperately clinging to life after the yacht they were on sank. Three days after the accident, after drifting a considerable distance from where the boat went down, they pull a stranger into the lifeboat. The stranger claimed to be the Lord.

In this series, *Heaven*, we turn to another of Mitch Albom's best-selling novels, *The First Phone Call From Heaven*. In this mystery, Albom takes readers on a roller-coaster ride of mystery and hope.

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The story begins one morning in the town of Coldwater, Michigan, when several phones start ringing. What makes the calls unusual is that the voices on the other end claim to be calling from heaven.

Is this the greatest miracle ever or a cruel hoax? Soon after, a reporter from Alpena arrives, thinking her boss has sent her on an insignificant news story, visitors suddenly overrun the small town.

Meanwhile, a disgraced pilot named Sully Harding

returns to Coldwater from prison only to discover his hometown gripped by "miracle fever." When his young son starts carrying a toy phone, hoping to hear from his mother in heaven, Sully has had enough.

As proof of an afterlife spreads, the town and the world start to transform. Church attendance increases as believers turn to the local pastors for confirmation. But Sully is convinced there is nothing beyond this sad life. So he digs deeper, determined to disprove these miracles for the sake of his child and his own broken heart.

Moving seamlessly between the invention of the telephone in 1876 and a world obsessed with the next level of communication, Mitch Albom takes readers on a breathtaking ride of frenzied hope.



Album reminds us that while no one is certain who invented the telephone, the U.S. patent belongs to the Scottish-born Alexander Graham Bell.

Many believe he stole it away from an American inventor named Elisha Gray. Others maintain that an Italian named Manzetti or a Frenchman named Bourseul or a German named Reis or another Italian named Meucci deserves credit. What few dispute is that all these men, working in the mid-nineteenth century, explored the idea of transmitting vocal vibrations from one place to another. But the very first telephonic conversation, between Bell and Thomas Watson, standing in separate rooms, contained these words: Come here. I want to see you.

"Come here, I want to see you." These words describe the familiar feelings of telephone conversations between two people who long to be together. Their sentiment also reflects the promise of an afterlife where we're once again reunited with lost loved ones.

Mitch Albom is the founder of SAY Detroit, a nonprofit that provides pathways to success for Detroiters in need through major health, housing, and education initiatives. The nonprofit is funded in part by profits coming from a dessert shop and a gourmet popcorn line. He and his wife Janine also operate Have Faith Haiti, a home and school for impoverished children and orphans in Port-au-Prince.

As an author, Mitch Album has written eight #1 New York Times bestsellers, Emmy Award-winning TV films, stage plays, screenplays, a nationally syndicated newspaper column, and a musical. As a result of his work at the Detroit Free Press, Album was inducted into both the National Sports Media Association and Michigan Sports Halls of Fame and received the Red Smith Award for lifetime achievement.

According to a recent Pew Research article, 85% of adults in Indonesia, where Islam is the predominant religion, say there is definitely or probably life after death. In Kenya, where most are Christians, 80% of adults agree. The percentage drops to 70% overall for adults living in the U.S.,

According to an analysis published by Ryan Burge, 90% of older adults born in the same decades as me believe there is some form of life after death. Interestingly, Burge discovered that even the majority of people claiming no religious affiliation believe in an afterlife.

Sixty-seven percent of adults living in our country believe in heaven, where most of us hope to reside after we leave this place. So, where and what is heaven? What is heaven like?

These are just a couple of the questions we plan to explore over the next six weeks, aided by a fictional novel, *The First Phone Call From Heaven*, written by Mitch Albom. We begin our new series, *Heaven*, with several phones ringing or vibrating around the town of Coldwater. Each phone call was a miracle. Calls happen every day with little notice. But a call placed to a member of Harvest of Hope Baptist Church was different. And so were the others.

In the case of Katherine
Yellin, the call was from her
dead sister, Diane. She said she
was calling from heaven. Mitch
Albom writes, "Had Katherine
Yellin never stood up that
Sunday morning, what
happened in Coldwater might
have passed like so many other
miracles, held quiet, wrapped
in whispers. But once exposed
to the public, miracles change
things."

Katherine can't wait to tell the world about it. The others who also received calls from deceased friends, relatives, and a former employee preferred to stay quiet.

"Faith, it is said, is better than belief, because belief is when someone else does the thinking," writes Albom when sharing that Pastor Warren's faith was intact. Belief, however, had become more difficult for the Baptist pastor. Sure, church attendance was up dramatically, but Katherine's claim was definitely coloring outside the lines of the pastor's understanding of heaven.

Was it a miracle, a hoax, or the overly enthusiastic imagination of a well-meaning member of his church? Yet, Elias Rowe supported Katherine's claim by informing the congregation that he also received a call. Moreover, Elisa never speaks in front of a crowd.

John tells us, in His Gospel, that Jesus spoke to His followers about the afterlife on the night of His arrest. "There are many rooms in my Father's house." Jesus said, "And I am going to prepare a place for you" (John 14:2).

A lot of pastors, including me, repeat these words from Jesus at funerals. Many of us prefer to call funerals celebrations of life or sometimes a "Going home celebration," reinforcing the promise Jesus made.

Jesus also said, "And after I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to Myself, so that you will be where I am" (John 14:3).

Scripture tells us that the place Jesus is referring to is heaven, which, according to Genesis chapter one, was created by God on the second day. The Prophet Amos said that, the Lord builds his home in the heavens (Amos 9:6).

Heaven is real. But what is it really like? A phone call from someone already there would help clear up this question.

Lots of phone calls from different people offering similar descriptions would be even better!
