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At the same time, thousands of federal workers are losing their jobs during the continuing government shutdown. The president's job rating continues to decline, even among those who voted for him, and the vast majority of Americans do not believe he cares about the needs of ordinary people. Meanwhile, members of Congress continue to collect their paychecks even as they fail to restrain the president's expanding abuses of power.

A growing number of Americans feel invisible. It's a sobering reflection of a nation where trust is shrinking and power feels increasingly distant.

This loss of confidence isn't just political — it's deeply personal. When people start to believe their voices don't matter, they stop speaking up. When they feel their choices don't change outcomes, they stop trying.

That quiet resignation seeps into families, churches, workplaces, and communities until hope begins to feel naïve. But the Christian story has always pushed back against despair. From the prophets to the Gospels, Scripture insists that each life bears divine agency — the sacred capacity to act, to speak, to resist inertia. In other words, to have agency.

When a hurricane forms, it feeds on warm, unresisted air — pressure differences that grow until destruction seems inevitable. Similarly, when people surrender their agency, when voices grow silent and choices shrink to despair, the forces of domination and disorder gain strength. Project 2025 has been called a "blueprint" for the dismantling of democratic norms, but its power relies on passivity — on citizens believing they can't do anything to change its course.

The gospel insists otherwise:
God gives us agency as the calm
eye within the storm — the
sacred power to stand, to act,
and to turn chaos toward renewal.
Every small act of courage
becomes a countercurrent, weakening the winds that threaten to
tear apart what is just and
humane.

Agency is the power to act instead of being acted upon — the belief that our choices still matter even when we don't seem to matter to our political leaders, and life feels out of control. It's what lets us say, "I can do something about this."

Spiritually, agency reflects the image of God within us: the divine capacity to respond, create, and shape what comes next. When we lose agency, we stop believing our actions make a

difference. When we reclaim it, hope moves again — and God's work through us becomes visible in the world. Agency is the heartbeat of hope.

This conviction is the heart-beat of this week's message.

Agency. We turn to the Gospel of Luke and reflect on the final chapters of Ocean Vuong's The Emperor of Gladness. Both point toward the same truth: even in systems that silence, there remains a spirit that stirs. And when that Spirit awakens in people again — when they believe they can still choose truth, compassion, and courage — change begins, not from the top down, but from the inside out.

It's no wonder that a recent Pew Research survey found that nearly three-quarters of Americans believe they have "little or no control" over the forces shaping their lives. Many of us feel the same weight: rising bills, uncertain work, political fatigue. When life presses in from every direction, despair begins to sound like reason.

And yet the Gospel speaks directly into that hopelessness.

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A movement is underway to change both the meaning and original intent of the word "woke." The word first appeared in African American communities in the 1940s. And through the 1960s, to "stay woke" meant to be aware of racial injustice and the need to be alert to systemic racism or hidden prejudice.

The term was revived through the Black Lives Matter movement and came to describe people who are conscious of social inequalities. Not only racism, but also sexism, homophobia, and other injustices. Being "woke" meant being informed and active in seeking fairness.

The word was adopted and often mocked by critics who saw "wokeness" as excessive political correctness, moral posturing, or ideological conformity. For some, "woke" became shorthand for progressive activism that had gone too far. The administration now labels any language or policy that encourages diversity, equity, and inclusion as "woke." Reverend John Ames, a 76-year-old Congregationalist minister, to his seven-year-old son. Ames is dying of heart disease, and he wants to leave behind a written record of his life, faith, struggles, and hopes for the boy who will grow up without him.

Through these letters, Ames tells the story of three generations of preachers in his family. His fiery abolitionist grandfather, his pacifist father, and himself. He recalls the moral and spiritual tensions that shaped their lives, particularly around questions of justice, forgiveness, and grace.

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Upcoming Worship Series — "Woke"

So today, "woke" is a contested word, which still means being aware and caring about justice for all of us. But to the radical right, "woke" means being overly sensitive or performative about social issues.

Beginning on the last Sunday in October, we'll start a new series, titled "Jesus Was Woke." This 5-Week spiritual journey was inspired by the Pulitzer Prize—winning novel, *Gilead*, by Marilynne Robinson. Together, we'll explore what it truly means to be awake—to live with eyes open to the wonder, memory, grace, belonging, and love that form the heart of the gospel.

To help guide us, we'll be reading Marilynne Robinson's novel as background. You can find a reading schedule in the Book Club article.

The story unfolds as the aging Rev. John Ames writes a letter to his young son, reflecting on his long life, his faith, and the light of grace that shines even through sorrow. It's a quiet, deeply spiritual novel—filled with beauty, forgiveness, and the struggle to love well in a complicated world.

Psalm 8 reminds us that God created us, cares for us, and put us in charge of caring for our planet.

What are human beings,, that you think of them, mere mortals, that you care for them? Psalm 8 Each week, our worship, scripture readings, and reflections will connect with a section of the novel. A companion devotional guide will be available to help you follow along, offering weekly scripture, insights from *Gilead*, and reflection questions for personal or group use.

This series invites you to slow down, listen deeply, and rediscover what it means to live awake—to notice the sacred in the ordinary, to remember

how God has carried us, to extend grace where it's hardest, to belong with humility, and to love as Jesus loved.

Whether you read along with the novel or simply join us in worship each week, this is a season to open our hearts and wake up to the living presence of God among us.

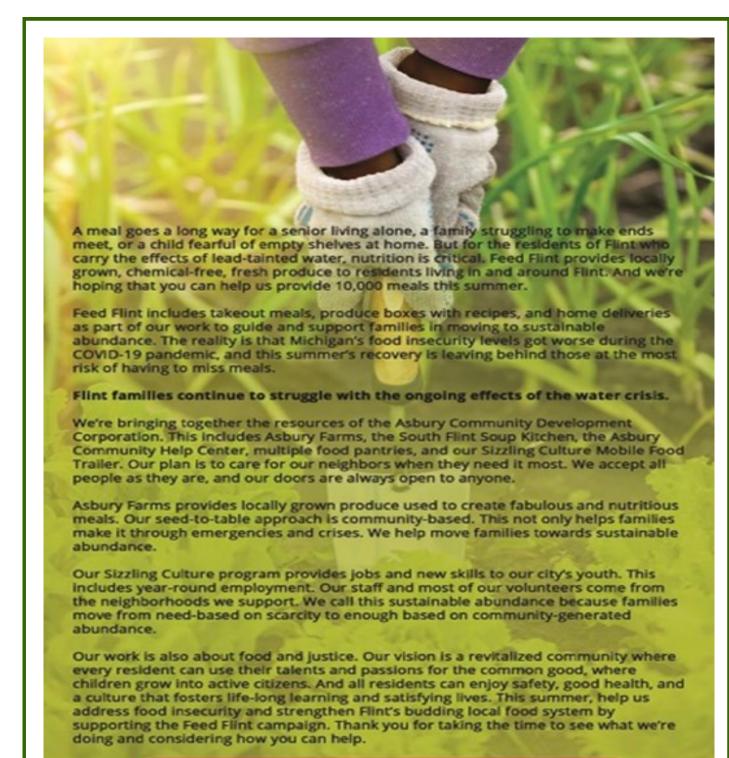

QUESTIONS FOR LIFE GROUPS:

- 1. Read Luke 7:11-17. In what ways does Jesus restore agency to the widow?
- 2. Read the article in this week's Circuit Rider titled Agency. Choose one act of resurrection, such as calling someone you've drifted away from. Help a neighbor. Volunteer. Consider practicing gladness as an act of defiance. Find a way to stay connected by joining a group where you pray with others and discuss how you see God inviting you to act. Join a non-violent protest organized around issues that matter to you.
- 3. How can your group members help you be more receptive to hearing and understanding the Word of God this week? Pray for one another to be blessed by the Holy Spirit with greater courage.

Jesus restores agency

Luke tells a story about Jesus meeting a funeral procession leaving the city of Nain. A widow's only son has died. In that culture, a woman without a husband or a son had no protection or income; her agency, identity, and future were effectively erased. She is the very picture of powerlessness and is mostly invisible to society.

But Jesus sees her. Luke says that, "When the Lord saw her, He had compassion on her." Jesus stops the procession, touches the bier, and commands the young man to rise. Soon, the boy breathes again. He is alive. And the widow receives back not only her child but also her agency, her future, and her voice.

When the Lord saw her, His heart was filled with compassion for her. Jesus said to her, "Don't cry."

Luke 7:11-17

This story reveals a divine pattern of compassion creating human possibility. But Jesus doesn't act *instead* of us. He acts *for us* so that we may act in similar ways *with* Him. Résurrection was not just limited to a child. A single mother's world is remade when love interrupts death.

The Emperor of Gladness

Ocean Vuong's best-selling novel, *The Emperor of Gladness*, captures this tension beautifully. As the story began, Hai, a young man hollowed by grief and guilt, tends to Grazina, an elderly woman slipping into dementia. Both characters are wounded, disoriented, living in worlds that seem to be collapsing.

Hai's care for her, his small decisions to stay rather than flee, become acts of agency. Grazina's fragmented presence, even in her confusion, calls him toward compassion. Their story reminds us that agency rarely looks heroic. More often, it's the simple, stubborn decision to keep loving when love feels futile.

For those who haven't read it yet, we'll let the novel speak for itself. Hopefully, you'll see why it became such a meaningful companion text for this series.

What It Means for Us

Let's suppose that this Gospel truth takes root in our daily lives, what might change?

First of all, we'll see change in our communities: we'll stop waiting for someone else to fix what's broken. We'll notice the "widows of Nain" around us — neighbors facing eviction, parents drowning in costs, young people caught in despair, immigrants under attack — and step toward them instead of around them. We'll also see a change in our churches: we'll move from preservation to participation, seeing ministry not as maintaining programs but as joining Jesus in resurrection work. Most of all, we'll see change in our own hearts: we'll refuse the lie that we' re spectators in our own story. And we'll come to realize that every small act of kindness, truth, or courage becomes a quiet resurrection. That's the world Jesus envisions: not one ruled by fear, but one animated by everyday agents of compassion.

What is your next step?

It's time for us to wake up to what numbs us. It's time for us to notice where we' ve surrendered choice — to fear, to habit, to exhaustion. Awareness is the first spark of agency.

Democratic representatives point to rising healthcare costs as the reason they're unwilling to support the current administration's proposed budget, which includes over \$1.2 trillion in cuts to federal spending, primarily from Medicaid and nutrition funding programs. It also introduces work requirements for Medicaid recipients, which could result in the loss of coverage for millions. These measures disproportionately impact rural hospitals, which serve populations with higher rates of chronic illness and limited access to alternative healthcare options.

The damage done by the most recent budget approval is already being felt. For example, Glenn Medical Center, the only hospital in rural Glenn County, California, closed on September 30, marking the end of 75 years of service to the community.

According to an article in The Guardian by Dani Anguian, the closure was due to the loss of its critical access hospital designation by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), a decision based on a technicality regarding the distance to the nearest hospital. This has left the county's 28,000 residents without essential emergency and ongoing care, sparking outrage and concern among the community.

Experts warn that if Democrats give in to the massive cuts to Medicare and Medicaid, this will have devastating effects on hundreds of rural hospitals, which rely more on federal funding from the US's most extensive public health insurance programs.

This standoff underscores the profound impact that decisions, whether made by individuals or institutions, can have on the well-being of others. It serves as a stark reminder of the importance of truth and transparency in all aspects of life, especially when it concerns matters of health and safety.

The truth is starting to come out about an incident in Chicago, where the Reverend David Black, of the First Presbyterian Church of Chicago, was shot in the head with pepper balls while praying in front of an ICE facility. The pastor spoke to CNN's Erin Burnett in his first television interview since the incident happened.

Video footage captured by a bystander shows masked ICE agents on the rooftop of the facility firing pepper balls at the protesters below. Black, who was wearing his clerical collar and had his arms outstretched in prayer, was struck directly on the head. The impact caused him to fall to his knees. After he was hit, agents continued to

fire, hitting him multiple times in the torso, arms, and legs. He claimed he could hear the agents laughing.

In response to a lawsuit alleging that federal agents illegally suppressed First Amendment rights with excessive force, a federal judge issued a temporary restraining order against the federal government. This order restricts the use of force and crowdcontrol measures against protesters and journalists at the Broadview facility.

The claim that climate change is a hoax is the most devastating of the lies coming out of Washington. Unfortunately, the truth behind policies is nearly impossible to uncover. And most journalists seem to be afraid to call out lies or report news that may be seen as contradicting the administration's rhetoric.

We live in a world where it's tempting to hold on to illusions, to stories we tell ourselves and others to make life feel safer or happier. In this week's reading from our companion book, Hai faces the consequences of living in such a world. Grazina's health is failing, and Hai must confront not only her reality but the lies he has told—both to her and to himself.

Hai's struggles reflect the personal consequences of avoiding the truth. Just as Hai faces the repercussions of his past actions, communities and nations also bear the weight of decisions made without complete honesty or consideration.

The closure of rural hospitals is a tangible example of how neglecting the truth can lead to real harm. How often do we cling to comforting stories, delusions, or half-truths to avoid facing hard realities? And what happens when the truth finally confronts us?

During the time of the Prophet Zechariah, the people of Israel had returned from exile in Babylon. The temple was in ruins, Jerusalem was a shadow of its former self, and the community was fragile and divided. Through the prophet Zechariah, God called them not just to rebuild their city but to rebuild their integrity.

These verses come from a moment of hope and warning. God promises restoration—prosperity, peace, and the return of joy—but ties that promise to a moral condition: you must live truthfully with one another.

God's people could not rebuild their nation with stones alone. They had to rebuild trust. God knows that truth is the seed of peace. Therefore, this week we're calling ourselves out to confront the truths in our own lives, communities, and our nation. By embracing honesty and transparency, we can slow down the erosion of trust and ensure that we do not inadvertently cause harm to those God calls us to serve and protect.

Let this story inspire us to reflect on our own actions and the truths we may be avoiding, and to commit to living with integrity and compassion. Remember that truth is the seed of peace.

And stay connected. Agency thrives in community. Join a group, pray with others, and talk about where you see God inviting you to act. Join a non-violent protest organized around issues that matter to you. We rise best when we rise together.

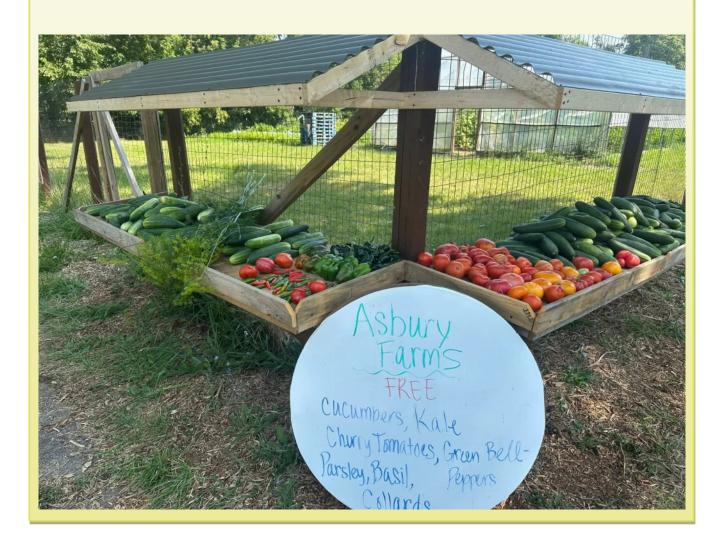

"MARSHA STEVENS-PINO/JUSTIN RYAN IN CONCERT"

Marsha Stevens-Pino is widely recognized as the "mother of contemporary Christian music." She penned the deeply beloved song "For Those Tears I Died (Come to the Water)" at age 16, and her influence helped shape the early Jesus Movement and contemporary Christian music scene.

After publicly coming out as a lesbian in 1981, she faced severe rejection: her songs were removed from hymnals, performances were canceled, and she was largely ostracized by the mainstream Christian music industry. In response, Marsha founded BALM Ministries (Born Again Lesbian Music), creating a vital artistic and spiritual home for LGBTQ+ Christians. Justin Ryan—a queer Christian singer-songwriter originally from Paducah, KY met Marsha through the Metropolitan Community Church after a period of personal crisis and disenfranchisement from traditional gospel circles. Encouraged by Marsha, Justin moved to Nashville to record with her, which led to studio work and background singing for renowned country artists. In 2024–2025, BALM recognized Justin's contributions by appointing him to their Board of Directors. In this leadership role, Justin helps steer outreach efforts, shares his training experience, and continues producing his popular Southern Gospel Sissy Series on Facebook and

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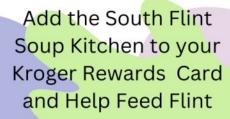
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The Alzheimer's Association website describes dementia as a general term for the loss of memory, language, problem-solving, and other thinking abilities, especially when these symptoms are severe enough to interfere with daily life. And dementia is usually the result of Alzheimer's. Dementia is not a single disease. Instead, dementia refers to a collection of symptoms representing a variety of diseases.

To diagnose Alzheimer's and other types of dementia, doctors review the patient's medical history, conduct a physical examination, collect data from laboratory tests, and look for changes In thinking, day-to-day function, and behavior associated with each type of dementia.

Notice the importance of both historical context and scientific data. Ignoring either one makes it difficult to come to a factual conclusion. The disease is likely to go undetected, but the symptoms will persist and likely worsen. The patient and their family suffer whether or not an accurate assessment is made.

What do hurricanes and dementia have in common? The first similarity that comes to mind is the destruction and turmoil caused by our climate, in the first case, and by disease in the second. We' re all familiar with the damage caused by hurricanes. More of us are also facing the heartbreak of dementia. The effects of both hurricanes and dementia are evaluated in stages. Hurricanes are rated by categories based on wind speeds, while dementia is measured in progressive stages. The higher the category or stage, the more severe the impact.

Our national dementia goes undetected if we all choose to ignore history and scientific

data. Moreover, in the case of our recent onslaught of national dementia, we're all facing a rapid increase in suffering. Fortunately, most are not fooled by fools, and many are sounding the alarm.

God is our shelter and is always ready to help in times of trouble. So we will not be afraid, even if he earth is shaken and mountains fall into the ocean depths, even if the violence shakes the seas; roar and rage, and the hills.

Psalm 46:1-3

Similarly, the Word of God spoken throughout scripture sounds alarms that we all need to hear. God's alarms are timeless and thus beg for faithful interpretation by persons chosen to speak truth to power. However, since God's Word requires interpreters, there are always false prophets who convincingly deceive those for whom their interpretation may fit the listeners' precon-

ditioned ideas.

Church bells remind me of the prophetic voices found in scripture and elsewhere. Speaking truth to power, prophets throughout history have spoken and sang warnings both to leaders and to the people they aspire to lead.

What do you feel when you hear Church bells?
Is it a sound that signals hope?
Like the lost seaman hearing the lighthouse horn,
it sings comfort to my soul.

But an alarm also sounded, time to change course before my journey ends.

What do you feel when you hear Church bells?

Do they stir your heart to sing?

The fog horn has sounded danger ahead,

For my path was well worn.

Maybe you're walking along a familiar but unsettling path. Maybe you've passionately supported our current president, hoping for a better tomorrow. Hopefully, you're beginning to focus more on facts than on lies.

So far, the U.S. remains a democracy, offering hope that new leaders will be elected. But we're going through a very dark time. Our leaders have failed us, but instead of listening to the warnings, they continue to organize around principles that fail to care for God's beloved. A hurricane is forming, and the destruction is already underway.

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
